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Introduction

Arenac County is a special place where outstanding natural resources, scenic beauty, outdoor recreation, a four-season climate, and unique landscapes combine to create a high quality of life for residents. The purpose of the Arenac County Master Plan is to provide a guide for Arenac County and its cities, townships and villages, to use in decision-making and coordination related to future land use, so that the qualities that make Arenac County special are not lost or compromised for future generations.

WHAT IS A MASTER PLAN?

The Master Plan is a document created by the Planning Commission and adopted by the County Board of Commissioners to guide the future growth, development, and redevelopment in the County. A Master Plan that is thorough, well thought out, and consistent is a document which helps ensure that Arenac County continues to be a desirable region in which to live and work. A County Master Plan differs from a local Master Plan in that, is that it tends to focus on policy, not individual properties or developments.

The Master Plan investigates and examines a variety of issues, both tangible and intangible. Within the document, the way the County has grown and changed will be examined. This will include detailed discussion on items ranging from who lives on in the County, to where in the County they live, and what they do for a living. Items that have remained constant or have not experienced significant changes will also be discussed. This includes the location of natural features, like such as water bodies and soils types, along with items like such as the transportation network.

In addition to these tangible items, opinions and desires are also considered. Residents and other stakeholders were asked for the thoughts on the Arenac County community, and their vision for the what the County can be in five, ten, or twenty years.

A County's Master Plan is unique in that it must function as an umbrella document, addressing plans and studies from other communities, and presenting a vision of growth, preservation, and development that dovetails with the planning documents of other jurisdictions in the County. The Plan provides overall guidance for growth and development for the communities of Arenac County.

The Master Plan is intended to act as a guide for future decisions by the County Planning Commission, the Board of Commissioners, staff, residents, and developers. It is designed as a map to direct and encourage development, redevelopment, and other improvements. The legal basis and rationale for the Master Plan are outlined in the Michigan Planning Enabling Act PA 33 of 2008, as amended (MPEA). Arenac County has developed this plan by requesting participation and cooperation from neighboring communities, jurisdictions, and utilities that have an interest within the County.

PLANNING PROCESS


The Master Plan is constructed from a number of various components, including a community and regional profile, natural resources inventory, existing land use, community input, goals and objectives, and land use development policies. The initial inventories, regional profile, natural resources, and existing land use serve as analytical tools to review the current conditions in the County. One of the most important sections of the plan is the public input, which is an important tool to guide future decision-making and developing goals. Finally, the goals and maps pertaining to land use opportunities, strive to improve and strengthen areas of the region that the residents enjoy, and to improve areas and to address issues that have been identified as a concern.

Due to the fact that each municipality in Arenac County has adopted their own zoning regulations, the County Planning Commission acts as an advisory group to the Townships, Villages, and Cities, but has no regulatory authority. As such, the County views their role in the land use planning process as one of resource, facilitator, and supporter. The main purpose of the County Master Plan is to

- Guide the use of limited resources in an efficient manner
- Promote public health, safety, and welfare
- Preserve the quality of the environment and protect cultural assets
- Support economic development
- Promote and support goals and strategies that align with the goals and values of the citizens

The process to update the Arenac County Master Plan began in the winter of 2019. The County contracted with Spicer Group of Saginaw to assist the Planning Commission in the preparation of this Master Plan. The Planning Commission met with the Spicer Group Planning Consultants between 2019 and 2020 to work on the plan. As required by the MPEA, the County required the procedures for notifying neighboring communities and registered entities so that each interested party was made aware of the ongoing planning effort and was provided an opportunity to comment on the Master Plan.

The following steps were followed in the creation of the Arenac County Master Plan:



Community input was sought through an online survey and stakeholder interviews. Feedback from the community, as well as inventory data collected at the beginning of the process, was the basis for the goals, objectives, and action items outlined in this plan. A draft of this document was prepared in November of 2020 and delivered to the Planning Commission for review. Then, the County submitted the draft plan to neighboring jurisdictions as required by the Planning Enabling Act. On December 21, 2020, the Planning Commission held a public hearing on the Master Plan, required by the Planning Enabling Act. This provided an additional opportunity for public input on the Master Plan. The final Master Plan was adopted on January 12, 2020.

Demographics and County Profile

ARENAC COUNTY HISTORY

Arenac County was one of several counties in Michigan named by Henry R. Schoolcraft. He noted the sandy soils and called it "a sandy place for a good footing". The sand reminded him of the sand the ancient Romans placed in their Coliseum to provide a better footing for the gladiators during their combats. The name "Arenac" is a combination of the Latin word for sandy, "arena", and a Native American word for earth, "ac". Thus, Arenac means "a sandy place".

Located at the bottom of the Saginaw Bay on Lake Huron, Native Americans have occupied the area for at least 5,000 years. Members of the Ottawa and Saginaw Chippewa Tribes used the three rivers that transverse the County; the Rifle, Au Gres and Pine Rivers. These rivers provided not only excellent fishing, but made good trade routes as well.

The first white settlers came from Canada in 1819. Most were of English and Scottish decent. The Saginaw Chippewa Tribe retained reservations at the mouths of the Rifle and Au Gres Rivers until 1937, when these lands were officially ceded to the U.S. government.

The land now called Arenac County was originally part of Bay County. In 1870, Deep River became the first township in what is now Arenac County. It has previously been part of Beaver Township in Bay County. It comprised of both the current Deep River and Adams Townships.

From 1881 through 1884 several families migrated to the Arenac area from West Prussia, including the Marks and Hertberg (1881), Netzlaff and Berg (1882) and Kaschub (1884).

In 1883, Arenac County was created from lands previously part of Bay County. The first permanent church, First Presbyterian Church of Maple Ridge, was organized in Clayton Township in the same year.

The Colombe farm in Standish Township was also established in 1883. This is now one of three Centennial Farms in Arenac County. The original buildings on the farm consisted of a saloon, a blacksmith shop and hotel with livery stables that also operated as a half-way house and stage coach stop.

The other two Centennial farms are both in Deep River Township. The Goodroe Farm is located on the edge of the Village of Sterling. The Hertzberg farm, also near the Village of Sterling, was acquired by the Hertzbergs sometime prior to 1886.

Newly designated Centennial farms include: The Dittenber farm located on Tonkey Road near AuGres and was purchased in 1910. Also, the Hagley farm founded in 1900 is the newest farm to be designated centennial, located on Conrad Road in Standish.

In 1886, the western portion of Deep River Township separated to become Adams Township, named for one of its first settlers, who later became its first supervisor.

1887 saw the establishment of St. John Evangelical Lutheran Church (WELS) in the Village of Sterling. Only a few years later, St. Mark Catholic Church was established in 1895 in Au Gres.

ARENAC COUNTY OVERVIEW

Arenac County is located in mid-Michigan along the Lake Huron shoreline, see Map 1. The County is bordered by Lake Huron to the east, Ogemaw and losco Counties to the north, Gladwin County to the west, and Bay County to the south. It covers approximately 681 square miles with 50 miles of shoreline. The interior of the County is largely forested with pockets of agriculture dispersed throughout the County.



The County has 12 townships, three cities, and three villages. There are three state routes and two US highways that provide access throughout the County, these include M-13, M-61, M-65, M-33, I-75, and US-23.

The County is unique in that it is the gateway to northern Michigan, any traveler headed north along the east coast of the State has to pass through the County on either I-75 or US 23. The County is in a prime location to capitalize on that traffic. This is especially true because of the beautiful natural resources that are in abundance throughout the entire County. The opportunities include a Great Lake shoreline, several rivers, and state forest land.

In addition to the tourism opportunities due to the bountiful natural resources, the County is also home to the Saginaw-Chippewa Tribe of Mt. Pleasant who opened the Saganing Eagle's Landing Casino and Hotel just south of Standish.

ARENAC COUNTY DEMOGRAPHICS

Background information from the U.S. Census is used to analyze a community's current demographic conditions. In the following sections, Census-based data on overall population trends, housing characteristics, and economic information in Arenac County is analyzed. This chapter is a summary of this data, presenting an overview of the demographic conditions within the County.

The information presented in this chapter uses the most recent Census Data, from the 2010 Census and 2017 American Community Survey (ACS). In the following sections, the text is a comparison of all the jurisdictions in Arenac County, including the County as a whole, all cities, villages, and townships.

Population

A community is defined by numerous factors, and one of the most important is population growth, stagnation, or decline. The basic foundation of a County, including utilities, housing, and transportation, are all directly impacted by population change. There are several different techniques for predicting or estimating population change over time. Using past trends and current data as a guide, this section of the Master Plan outlines population trends and existing conditions. Understanding these conditions will help Arenac County prepare for the future.

Population Trends

In general, Arenac County has a very small population as compared to the land area of the County. Of the 83 counties in Michigan, Arenac is ranked 68th in total population. The majority of the counties with a population smaller than Arenac are located in the Upper Peninsula. Standish is the only City in the County with a population greater than 1,000 people, at 1,509, Au Gres has a population of 889, and Omer only has 313 people. None of the three Villages in the County have more than 600 people. Sterling has the largest population, at 530, which is larger than Omer. Turner and Twining are both very small with 114 and 181 residents, respectively. The Townships are also small, of the 12 Townships in Arenac County, only half of the have a population greater than 1,000. The Township with the largest population is Deep River with 2,149 residents and the smallest is Turner with 550 residents. Populations of these sizes indicate the County is very rural.




Figure 1 - County Population Trends

For the past five decades, the County has experienced a steady growth in population. Figure 1 illustrates the population changes every 10 years beginning in 1960. From 1960 to 2000, the population in the County grew from 9,860 to 17,269. The population peaked in 2000 and since that time the County has been in a trend of population decline. Between 1970 and 1980, the County had the largest increase of any decade with an addition of about 3,500 people. In 2000, the County had a peak population of 17,269 residents, in 2010 the population decreased to 15,899. This was a decrease of approximately 1,370 people, or 7.9%. According to the 2017 ACS, the population in Arenac County is 15,238. This is a decrease from the 2010 Census. However, it is important to remember ACS data is estimate data and the Decennial Census is a full population count. The County will not have another full population count until the 2020 Census. Until that time, the County should consider the trends indicated by the ACS data, but should not rely on them. Arenac County and the State both lost population, at -7.9% and -0.6%, between 2000 and 2010, while the United States gained almost 10%.

An in-depth analysis of the population trends in each jurisdiction of Arenac County between 2000 and 2010 shows that each City and Village in the County had a population decline, and all the Townships aside from Moffatt and Sims and Adams also had population declines. Of the three Cities in the County, Au Gres had the steepest decline at 13.5%, Standish lost 4.6%, and Omer lost 7.1%. Of the Villages, Turner had the largest population decline at 18%, while Twining declined by 5.7% and Sterling declined by 0.6%, the smallest percentage of all the Cities and Villages in the County. The Townships had similar rates of decline, with most ranging between 1% to 6%. The outliers were Clayton Township with a decrease of 0.4%, the smallest of all the jurisdictions in the County, and Lincoln Township with a decrease of 38.1%. Mason and Tuner Townships both had decreases of approximately 14%. In comparison, Moffatt Township increased in population from 1,121 to 1,184, or 5.6%, and Sims Township increased from 1,091 to 1,095 or 0.4%.

Population change happens for many reasons. The most common reasons for population decrease include an aging population, little family growth, a decrease in migration, lack of jobs, or schools. The following charts indicate that Arenac County's population decline can be attributed to an aging population and a decline in average household size.

Age Distribution

Analyzing the age of the population is another useful way to understand the needs of a community. The following discussion will focus on the age distribution within Arenac County and the median age of the residents. Both are key indicators in determining how a population changes over time.

The population groups in the following tables are categorized into the following age groups:

- Under 5 Young children
- Ages 5 19 School age children
- Ages 20 24 Young adult
- Ages 25 44 Family starting/family stage
- Ages 44 64 Family/Empty nesters stage
- Ages 65-84 Retired age
- Ages 85 and older Elderly

Overall the County has more males than females. Table 3, on the following page, is a breakdown of the age distribution in the County by sex for 2000 and 2010. In 2010, 49.3% of the population in the County was female, and 50.7% was male. This compares to 48.6% of the population that was female and 51.4% was male in 2000. Between 2000 and 2010, the percentage of the female population in the County increased, but both groups decreased in population.

Over the past decade, the age distribution of the population in Arenac County has changed significantly. The overall population in the County is aging, this is illustrated in the age ranges 45-64 and 65-84, and 85+, because these three were the only groups to have an increase in population between 2000 to 2010, even though the County lost population. The younger age groups have similar trends to one another, in that each group lost population. The loss is most reflected in the 25-44 age group, which has experienced losses over 6%. When comparing the age ranges throughout the County, the largest population of residents, (32.1%) is in the 45-64 age group, which experienced a 6.5% increase in population from the 2000 figures. These figures can be found in Table 3.

To see a further breakdown of age groups by community for 2010, please reference Tables 4a through 4d, on the following pages. The only age groups in the County that have a larger percentage of the population as compared to the State and Country are the 45-64, 65-84, and 85+. The County has a smaller percentage of the population in all the other age groups. Generally, the communities in Arenac County have a similar age distribution. A few communities that stand out are Au Gres Township which has the smallest percentage of residents under 5 years of age at 4.7%. Whitney Township has the smallest percentage of population between 20-24 at 2.3%. Arenac Township has the largest percentage of population in the 45-64 age group. Standish has the largest percentage of the population older than 85, while Mason Township has the smallest percentage at 0.7%.

Each age group has very specific needs. It is important for a community to understand how many people are in each stage of life in their community so they can plan for the necessary resources. A community with a growing young population and family population, needs good schools, activities for families, single-family homes, and active recreation uses. As compared to a population with a larger concentration of empty nesters or retirees, who may need condos, apartments, public transportation, healthcare facilities, and passive recreation.

Median Age

The median age of a community is another tool which can be used to analyze the overall age of a population. Even more insightful, is the change of the median age over a period of time. It is a good indicator of how fast or slow a population is aging. Referencing Table 5a, Arenac County is aging much faster than the State or Country. The median age in Arenac County grew from 40.1 years in 2000 to 46.7 years in 2010. In addition to aging at higher rate, the County's median age is significantly higher than the state or county as well. The median age for the County is 7.8 years older than that of the State, and 9.5 years older than that of the Country. Arenac County is aging at a rate doubly as fast and the rest of the State.

Generally, the communities of Arenac County are following the same trend of the County as a whole. The two exceptions to this trend are the Village of Twining and the Village of Turner. Both Villages had a decrease in the median age, meaning their population was younger in 2010 than it was in 2000. The community with the oldest median age in Arenac County is Sims Township which has a median age of 57.2, Whitney Township is the second oldest community with a median age of 55.1. The communities with the youngest median age in the County are The Village of Twining at 34.5 years and Lincoln Township at 39.5 years. The communities with the

largest change in median age between 2000 and 2010 were Turner Township which had an increase in median age by 10 years, and Mason Township with an increase of 9.4 years.

Figure 2 - Median Age Trends




Household Characteristics

In addition to population demographics, the Census also measures various household and housing characteristics. The household characteristics analyze the human element of each household. These characteristics give a community a broader understanding of who lives within their jurisdiction, how they live there, and what family structures are present.

Average Household Size

Average household size is a measure that shows the average number of people living in a household in a community. This figure is an indicator of several things, including the number of families with children, the change in family structures over time, and the number of residents living alone. The average household size in the County in 2010 is 2.34 this is a decrease from 2.45 in 2000. As compared to the State and the Country, the average household size of the County is much smaller and decreased at a much higher rate over the 10-year period.

All the communities in Arenac County aside from the City of Omer, the Village of Twining, the Village of Sterling, and Moffatt Township also had decreases in their average household size. This trend could be happening for many reasons, but with a larger retiree/elderly population there are often smaller household sizes because there is an increase in single-persons living alone, smaller family sizes, or other non-family structures. These trends require specific types of housing that the County and local jurisdictions will need to consider. For example, if more people are living aloneand there are fewer families, the demand for single-family housing structures could be less than the demand for apartments or condos.

Generally, the decreases in average household size were similar throughout the County, however, the communities with the largest decreases were the Village of Turner and Mason Township. These two stand out in the County because they had a decrease that was more than double the other communities. The communities in the County with the largest average household size are Adams Township and the Village of Twining, both with an average household size of 2.66, then the Village of Turner with an average household size of 2.65. The communities with the smallest average household size are the City of Au Gres (2.00) and Sims Township (2.08).

Household Structure

The following information categorizes the type of family unit that lives in each household. The U.S. Census breaks families into 2 categories, which have several sub-categories. The first category is family households, which includes the sub-categories: married couple families, male householder, and female householder. The second category is nonfamily households, which includes the sub-categories: living alone and not living alone.

In Arenac County, 67.8% of households are considered to be family households. Of the 67.8%, 53.1% are married couple families, 9.6% are female householders, and 5.1% are male householders. Between 2000 and 2010 the number of family households decreased from 70.3% to 67.8%. Between 2000 and 2010, nonfamily households increased from 29.7% to 32.2%. Nonfamily households are defined as people living together who are not related by blood or marriage. In Arenac County, 27.5% of people are householders living alone and 4.7% are householders not living alone. Table 7 illustrates these changes.

Housing Characteristics

In addition to household characteristics, the U.S. Census also measures housing characteristics, or the occupancy, number, type, ownership, and value of the housing units within a jurisdiction. Once a community understands the way their population is changing, and the needs of the shifting population, then it is important to understand what housing options are available to Arenac County residents. Analyzing this information allows the community to see where there is a lack or gap of a certain type of housing, the conditions of the housing stock, and the cost of living. Understanding these changes will help Arenac County plan for changes in the future.

Housing Types

The Census measures several different housing types, which are included in Table 8, on the following page. A 1-unit, detached structure is a typical single-family housing unit, while a 1-unit, attached structure is a single-family housing unit that is attached to several other single-family housing units (such as townhomes or row houses), but is a completely separate unit from the adjoining neighbors. There is a total of 9,803 housing units in the County. Of those, 82.5% are 1-Unit, Detached structures. In Arenac County, the second most prevalent form of housing is Mobile Homes, at 11.5%. All the multi-family housing units are relatively equal across the different types, each around 1% of the total housing stock. According to the Census, there are no County residents living in boats, RV, or vans. These kinds of housing characteristics are a way for the County to evaluate the existing structures to determine if the housing needs of the residents are being met.

Housing Occupancy

The Census measures the number and tenure of housing units in a jurisdiction. Then, the data is cataloged as either occupied or vacant units. Then, occupied units are categorized as owner or renter occupied. Vacant units are categorized as their vacancy type (i.e. for rent, for sale, under construction, seasonally vacant etc.).

In Arenac County in 2010, there were a total of 9,803 housing units, of which 6,701, or 68.4%, are occupied and 3,102, or 31.6% were vacant. These percentages are very different than that of the State and Country, which both have similar occupancy rates in the mid to high 80% range and vacancy rates in the mid to low teens. Arenac County's high vacancy rate can be attributed to the many seasonal homes located throughout the County. The communities in the County with the highest occupancy rates, and therefore the lowest vacancy rates, are The City of Standish (90.8%), Lincoln Township (90.4%), Sterling (89.8%), Adams Township (85.5%), The Village of Twining (84%), and Omer (80.9%). These are all Cities or Villages in Arenac County, aside from Adams and Lincoln Townships which are along the western border of the Township. The communities with the highest vacancy rates are Sims Township (55.1%), Whitney Township (53%), Moffatt Township (46.1%), Au Gres Township (39%), The City of Au Gres (27.3%), and Arenac Township (25.3%). Sims, Whitney, and Moffatt have a significantly higher vacancy rate than the other on the list, both Sims and Whitney are located along the lakeshore, as is Au Gres Township and the City of Au Gres.

Housing Tenure

In addition to understanding the housing units in the County, another analysis is the housing tenure, or ownership, of the occupied units. The following set of charts and tables depict housing tenure and the percentage of home ownership rates in the County over the past 10 years. Of the 9,803 housing units in the County, 6,701 units are occupied. Of the 6,701 occupied units, 83.6% are owner-occupied and 16.4% are renter occupied. In Arenac County, the rate of owner-occupied housing units is significantly higher than that of the State (72.1%) and the Country (65.1%). This means there are significantly less renters in Arenac County. The housing tenure breakdown per jurisdiction can be found in Tables 10a through 10d. Overall the Townships have a very high owner-occupancy rate between 80% - 95%, with most of them being higher than the County rate at 83.6%. The highest rates in the County are in the following Townships: Sims, Au Gres, Turner, and Whitney. These all have owner-occupied housing rates over 90%. The communities with the highest renter-occupied units are in the Cities and Villages. These communities are Standish, Au Gres, Twining, and Sterling. Omer and Turner have owner-occupancy rates similar to that of the County, both in the mid-80% range.

A deeper review of homeownership patterns in the County reveals a trend that the majority of the communities in the County have a smaller percentage of homeowners in 2010 as compared to 2000. The homeownership rate in 2010 was 83.6%, which is down from 84.6% in 2000. Both Michigan and the County also had a decrease in homeownership over the same 10-year period, however, the County decreased at a slower rate than the State or Country. Of all the communities in Arenac County, the only communities to have an increase in homeownership were the following Townships: Arenac, Clayton, Sims, Turner and Whitney. Most increased right around 1%, but Turner Township increased at a much more drastic rate at 6.9%. In comparison, most communities had a decrease in homeownership rates between 0% - 3%, two outliers that had a much higher decrease were Lincoln Township at 5.6% and Adams Township at 8.3%.

Structures by Vacancy Type

The U.S Census breaks down vacant units into the following categories: seasonal, for rent, rented, but unoccupied, for sale only, sold but unoccupied, or other vacant. Tables 12a through 12d breakdown the vacancies by jurisdiction. If a housing unit is only seasonally occupied, the Census considers it vacant, therefore the high vacancy rates in the County can be explained by the large amount of seasonal housing units. There is a high percentage of seasonal housing throughout the County, particularly along the shoreline and in the wooded areas of the County.

High seasonal vacancy rates are not a reality for all Arenac County communities, and this trend is most apparent when the vacancy rates in each township, city, and village are compared individually against the State and Country rates. The communities that do not have a large number of seasonal housing units compare more closely to the percentages of the State and Country. The majority of the Cities and Villages in Arenac County have rates that are comparable to the State. Similarly, a couple Townships in the County also have rates that compare with the State. Adams and Lincoln Townships have the smallest percentage of seasonal homes as compared to the other Townships in the County. The Townships with the largest percentage of seasonal homes are Sims (50.5%), Whitney (47%), Moffatt (40.6%), and Au Gres (32.8%). Sims, Whitney, and Au Gres Townships are all located along the Lake Huron shoreline, and Moffatt Township is located in an area that is very wooded with a lot of natural resources such as waterways and public land. The difference between the types of seasonal vacancies would be lakefront homes in Sims, Whitney, and Au Gres township versus wooded cabins in Moffatt Township. The other Townships in the County all have seasonal rates that are almost double that of the State.

Housing Value

The median housing value in Arenac County is \$88,900, which is less than both the State (\$119,200) and the Country (\$174,600). There are various reasons for this, and one major contributing factor is that almost a third of the housing stock in the County is seasonal homes. Table 12 illustrates the values of owner-occupied housing units in Arenac County.

Housing Costs as a Percent of Income

A conventional indication of housing quality is the percent of income spent on housing. Housing expenditures that exceed 30% of household income are viewed by planners as an indicator of a housing affordability problem for residents. Sixty-five percent of homeowners in Arenac County spend less than 30% of their income on monthly housing costs. This means 35% of homeowners spend more the 30% of their income on monthly housing costs. In comparison, 75% homeowners pay less than 30% of their income in the State and the same is true for 70% of homeowners across the Country.

The same consideration is true for renters as homeowners. Housing expenditures that exceed 30% of a household income are viewed as an indicator of housing affordability issues. In Arenac County 52% of renters spend less than 30% of their income on rent, which is a higher percentage than both the State (49%), and the Country (49%). This means more renters in Arenac County spend less money on rent as compared to the other jurisdictions.

The Census also measures median gross rent, which is the median costs that renters spend on their housing and estimated costs for utilities for all the rental units in the County. By comparing the median household income to median gross rent, it can be determined if renters have affordable housing options in the County. The median household income in Arenac County is \$39,947. Thirty percent of that equates to \$11,984 per year. This is approximately \$998 per month. The median gross rent in the County is \$610, which suggests there are affordable rental housing options in the County.

When comparing homeowner costs to renter costs in Arenac County, 35% of homeowners pay greater than 30% of their income on housing, and 47% of renters pay more than 30% of their income on housing, which is an indication of higher rental costs compared to homeownership. This trend is also true in the State and Country, where 50% of renters in Michigan pay more than 30% of their income on rent and 25% of homeowners pay the same.

Economic Characteristics

Economic characteristics comprise a major part of U.S. Census data. It is important to examine the economic status of a community to determine the ability to support future commercial, residential, and industrial development. The data indicates the strengths and weaknesses in the County, while alluding to trends that may aid or hurt the economic future of the community. This economic analysis utilizes 2000 and 2010 U.S. Census data and 2017 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates.

Education

Educational attainment measures the education level of a community. It allows for analysis of the skills and capabilities of the labor force and the economic vitality of the community. The level of educational attainment achieved within a community illustrates the types of jobs that are suitable or necessary for citizens. The U.S. Census Bureau reports on all levels of education attainment including those who did not complete high school, those who earned a high school diploma or an equivalent, those that attended some college, earned an associate's degree, and those who earned a bachelor's degree or higher. The following analysis includes the educational attainment for all residents in Arenac County 25 years of age or older.

As illustrated in Figure 17a, Arenac County has the largest percentage of individuals with high school diplomas and Associate's Degrees, as compared to the State and Country, and has the smallest number of residents who earned a Bachelor's Degree or Graduate or Professional Degree when compared to both geographies. Tables 17a through 17d, illustrate the educational attainment for each community in Arenac County. The communities with the most people who have earned a bachelor's degree are Sims and Whitney Townships.

In addition to educational attainment, the State of Michigan measures enrollment data for all school districts K through 12. Within Arenac County there are four different school districts. The Arenac Eastern School District recently closed. Additionally, two of the four, primarily serve losco County and Ogemaw County to the north, but small sections dip into Arenac County in Whitney, Mason, and Clayton Township. The two main districts that serve the majority of Arenac County are Au Gres-Sims School District, and the Standish-Sterling School District. The enrollment information in Table 18 below, focuses on these two districts and Map 3 depicts the school district boundaries in the County.

Income

Income and poverty levels are measuring tools that can be used to determine the relative economic health of a community. Increases in income can show economic success while increases in the percent of individuals below the poverty level can show economic downturn. Income is measured at three levels: median household income, median family income, and per capita income. Table 19 illustrates these three levels in each jurisdiction.


Measuring income is a way to measure wealth, or a relative measure of a population's willingness and/or ability to pay for infrastructure, housing, and discretionary municipal services.

Median household income is a measure of the total income of the people living in a single household. The median household income in Arenac County is \$39,947. This is less than the State (\$52,668) and Country (\$57,652).

Median family income is a measure of the total incomes of a family living in a single household. On average, this number is higher than median household income for two reasons: families often have 2 individuals earning an income, and the category does not include single persons living alone. The median family income in Arenac County is \$49,656. This is more than \$10,000 higher than the median household income. The median family income in the County is less than the State (\$66,653) and Country (\$70,850).

Per capita income is the amount of income all individuals within the jurisdiction, regardless of age or employment, would receive if income was equally divided among all residents. This number is usually the lowest of the three measurements, and is a good indication of the overall wealth of a community. In Arenac County, the per capita income is \$22,622. The State and Country both have higher per capita incomes at \$28,938 and \$31,177, respectively

The top three communities with the highest median household income in Arenac County are Adams Township (\$52,813), Au Gres Township (\$46,964), and Arenac Township (\$44,250). The communities with the highest median family income are Adams Township (\$60,313), Au Gres Township (\$57,778), and Deep River Township (\$56,136).

Individuals with Income Assistance

In addition to the previous income measurements, another measure of income is to analyze residents who are collecting social security or on government assistance programs. These numbers represent segments of the population that are older or do not have a large household income, which could highlight trends such as willingness to pay for certain services, like road millages or parks and recreation.

Overall, Arenac County has a higher percentage of residents who need income assistance as compared to the State and Country. Forty-six percent of the population has a social security income, as compared to 34% at the State level, and 30% across the Country. This number is representative of the population within a jurisdiction that falls into the following categories:

- Withdrawing from a personal retirement plan
- Withdrawing from a pension from an employer
- Based on marital history
- Based on health status
- Based on work, adult, and child disabilities

It is a good indicator for the community because people living on a fixed income have very different priorities and needs than those that are working. This number can be attributed to the larger elderly/retiree population Arenac County.

Poverty

Poverty is the final factor used in determining the economic health of a community. The U.S. Census measures poverty by comparing the total income of a person's family with the threshold appropriate for the family size and characteristics. There are a total of 48 thresholds which determine the level of an individual's poverty. According to the 2017 ACS data, 18.5% of individuals in Arenac County live below the poverty line. The County and State have poverty levels which are smaller than that of the County, at 15.6% and 14.6% respectively. Income levels are generally related to a community's educational attainment level. Recall from earlier, in Table 17a, Arenac County contained the lowest percentage of citizens who have obtained a bachelor's degree or higher, and earns the least amount of income (Table 19a). The top three communities with the lowest poverty levels in Arenac County are Adams Township (10%), Au Gres Township (10.7%), and Sims Township (11.7%). The communities with the highest poverty levels are Village of Twining (36%), Village of Turner (32.4%), and The City of Standish (32.7%).

Employment

Labor force characteristics depicts how people report their current work status, as well as their intended work status. Labor force characteristics also contribute to land use decisions. The greater percentage of the population working, the more need for connectivity in the road system, and alternative housing types for those who do not want traditional home ownership responsibilities. It is important to note that labor force and income do not always vary directly and the percentage of unemployed does not necessarily indicate a lower income community.

The population of the Arenac County labor force that is over 16 years of age is made up of 5,842 of the County population, the remaining individuals who are not in the labor force. This is another indication of the high proportion of senior citizen and retirees in Arenac County.

Employment by industry measures the type of industry present in a community and the people who travel to a specific destination, such as a large industrial site, or who do not travel at all, such as farmers. From a land planning standpoint, these figures show trends in housing and traffic needs over time. Table 22 indicates the employment by industry for Arenac County in 2000 and 2017. The top three employment industries in the


County are educational services, and health care and social assistance (23.4%), manufacturing (16.5%), and retail trade (12.9%). These were also the top three industries in 2000.

Learning About Arenac County

Natural Features Inventory

Arenac County is a rural forested area bordering Lake Huron and the Saginaw Bay. The county is part of the northern Michigan recreational area, with resort development along Lake Huron. Natural assets such as the Gladwin State Forest, the Au Gres and Rifle Rivers and the Lake Huron shoreline, make it attractive for tourism. Agriculture is an important segment of the economy and accounts for 45% of land use. Arenac County is part of the six-county, state designated Huron Shores Heritage Route, one of 14 in the state.



The county is a popular recreation area, with plenty of canoeing, kayaking, hunting and fishing opportunities. The Au Gres and Rifle Rivers continue to be favorite canoeing, kayaking and fishing spots. Favorite fish include trout, perch, walleye and smelt. Suckers are also a popular favorite, celebrated annually with the City of Omer's Sucker Festival. Local efforts are underway to restore the reputation of the Pine River as an excellent perch fishing river. The MDNR Lake Huron Boat Launch and Breakwall located at the mouth of the Au Gres is also the only designated harbor of refuge for boaters between Bay City to the south and East Tawas to the north. The City of Au Gres has a marina connected to Lake Huron with an inland channel to the city.



The County draws many nature and hunting enthusiasts. Located just to the west of Au Gres is the Gladwin State Forest which provides good small game hunting. There is also the Wigwam Bay State Wildlife Area located about halfway between the cities of Standish and Au Gres, near the Saginaw Bay. Birders and other wildlife enthusiasts flock to Charity Island located in the Bay, just off Whitney Township. Almost 80% of this 222 acre island and its three miles of shoreline are owned by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which brought the island into the national protected area called the Michigan Islands National Wildlife Refuge.



With all of the natural resources available to both residents and visitors, the natural environment plays a significant role in the development of Arenac County. The County provides unique features offering rolling terrain, access to the Lake Huron, woodlands and state land, and wide open agricultural spaces. It is this combination of options that provide the specific character that residents who choose to live here seek. It is important for a community to analyze the land before beginning development, because the natural environment can significantly impact development, or vice versa.





Arenac County contains ample natural amenities. These resources provide residents a clean water supply, and a strong base for tourism and agriculture. The County wishes to preserve natural features while utilizing them for recreation and relaxation. This section analyzes the natural features located throughout the County, and the maps referenced throughout the text can be found at the end of this chapter.

TOPOGRAPHY

The topography of Arenac County is generally flat to gently rolling, which is illustrated on Map 4. The lower elevations are located along the shoreline, and as the land continues west toward the interior of the state the elevation increases with the highest elevations in Clayton and Adams Townships. The only variations to this gradual elevation change are located along the rivers which traverse the County. The elevation of the riverbeds is lower than the surrounding land. In general, these gradual changes are not an impediment to development in the County, as there are no steep climbs or cliff faces. However, the riverbanks may pose certain challenges that should be considered when siting any future construction. As each area of the County

presents specific conditions in regards to topography, each site will have specific challenges for property owners to work around. The County should encourage the local communities to use best practices when siting structures along sensitive natural areas.

SOILS AND PRIME FARMLAND

Map 5 depicts certain soil types in Arenac County. The soils are defined by various characteristics in relation to their qualities best suited for farming. It is important to categorize and inventory



the land that is best suited to farming because agriculture is such an important part of the Arenac County economy and way of life. If the County would like to protect high-quality land in the future, this is land that should be prioritized for agriculture uses.

According to the National Resources Conservation Service, Prime Farmland is land that has the best combination of physical and chemical characteristics for producing food, feed, forage, fiber, and oilseed crops, and is also available for these uses. These soils are of the highest quality and can economically produce sustained high yields of crops when treated and managed according to acceptable farming methods. Very specific technical criteria were established by Congress to identify prime farmland soils. In general, the criteria reflects adequate natural moisture content; specific soil temperature range; pH between 4.5 and 8.4 in the rooting zone; low susceptibility to flooding; low risk to wind and water erosion; minimum permeability rates; and low rock fragment content. Therefore, the soil indicated as prime farmland, if drained, does not naturally fit under the specified criteria, but would if it were cultivated using modern agricultural practices. Map 5 illustrates that there are pockets of prime farmland located throughout the County and larger sections of prime farmland, if drained. The largest portions of prime farmland are located in Clayton and Lincoln Townships with other significant amounts also found in Mason, Adams, Moffatt and Deep River Townships. Surrounding the prime farmland is the prime farmland, if drained land. Prime farmland, if drained, can also be found in Turner, Whitney, Sims, Au Gres, and Standish Townships. Agriculture is large part of Arenac County's economy and way of life, and is important to consider in any master planning effort.

WOODLANDS

Woodlands information for Arenac County was derived from the Michigan Geographic Data Library (MiGDL). The dataset divides forested areas in the County into three categories: deciduous forest, evergreen forest, and mixed forest. Deciduous forests are characterized by trees that shed foliage according to the season such as maples, ash, elms, oaks, and others. Evergreen forests consist of conifers or evergreen trees, and mixed forests are with both deciduous species and evergreen species. The map also shows the location of open grasslands in the County.

Arenac County is fortunate in that a large percentage of the land in the County is wooded and natural. This land is perfect for recreation opportunities, provides great habitat for wildlife, and is a good resource for the local economy. The recreation opportunities are a great draw for the tourism industry and the wildlife habitat makes the County an ideal place for hunters.

Map 6 illustrates the wooded land in Arenac County. Each Township in the County has a significant portion of wooded land. The only large areas that are not wooded are currently used for agricultural purposes. Each



Township has some agricultural land but the Township with the least amount and the most wooded land are generally found on the western end of the County, away from the lakeshore. Moffatt, Adams, Clayton, Deep River, Mason, and Arenac Townships are examples of Townships with the most wooded land.

This land is primarily private, however, the State owns large tracts of public land in several Townships throughout the County. Map 7 depicts the state owned land which is located in Moffatt, Adams, Clayton, Deep River, Mason, Arenac, Whitney, Au Gres, and Standish Townships. Most of this land is just state owned property that is not managed and only accessible via off-road trails. However, there are three DNR managed access points in the County. The first is the Wigwam Bay State Wildlife Area which is a 4,300 acre property located in Arenac and Standish Townships. The DNR has designated this land for hunting and also uses it as a waterfowl breeding area. The other two sites are both boat launches located in Whitney and Au Gres Township. Overall, the DNR owns more than 8,000 acres in the County. This is all public land open for recreation. In addition to the State Land, the US Fish and Wildlife Service owns the majority of Charity Island. The island is located off the coast of Sims Township and is approximately 265 acres. It is undeveloped except for the lighthouse on the northernmost point of the island. There is also a marina on the northern shore.

WETLANDS AND WATERWAYS

Wetlands areas are lands defined by the existence of water, either on or near the surface, during a portion of the year. In addition to standing water, other characteristics of a wetland include poorly drained soils and water-loving vegetation, which may also be physical indicators of wetlands. These ecosystems are a sensitive and vital part of the natural water cycle, and when they are negatively affected, without proper mitigation,

many problems such as standing water, water filtration, aquifer recharge, and flooding will occur in unexpected areas.

Development concerning wetlands is regulated by the State of Michigan. At the heart of Michigan's wetland regulatory program is Part 303, Wetland Protection, of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act (Act 451 of 1994), formerly referred to as the Goemaere-Anderson Wetlands Protection Act, P.A. 203 of 1979. The Michigan Department of Energy, Great Lakes, and Environment (DEGLE) administers the permit program. This legislation was passed to protect wetlands by restricting their use to certain activities only after permitted approval by the State of Michigan. Permits are approved only upon a review of an environmental assessment filed by the petitioner that shows the avoidance of wetland resources to the greatest extent possible and minimization of unavoidable wetland impacts.

Under the Act, the following wetlands are protected:

- Wetlands contiguous to an inland land, pond, river, stream, or similar water course. Wetlands
 adjacent to the lakes, rivers, creeks, and drains in Arenac County would fall in this category.
- Wetlands five acres in size, or larger, in counties that contain a population of at least 100,000 people. This category does not apply to Arenac County.

The wetland information on Map 8 was derived from MiGDL and the National Wetlands Inventory (NWI). Arenac County has large tracts of wetlands, due in part to the low elevation and proximity to Lake Huron and also to the network of rivers and streams that traverse the County. Each Township in the County has wetlands, there are significantly more wetlands along the shoreline and the western border of the County then through the interior of the County. Unfortunately, the lakeshore is primarily private property, which means there is little public access for swimming or beaches.

One of the most important natural features of Arenac County is the 50 miles of shoreline along Lake Huron. The coastline is a one of Arenac County's defining features and provides access to both Lake Huron and the Saginaw Bay. The County coastline is mostly wooded and developed with single family homes. These homes often have beach access and docks. There are a few parks along the shoreline for public access and two public boat launches. The boat launches provide access to some of the best fishing the State can offer anglers.

In the past few years, the water level in the Great Lakes has been rising. In the summer of 2019, the Great Lakes broke all high water records and the high water has drastic effects for all the communities along the Great Lakes shoreline. This included Arenac County, where many lakefront property owners have lost all the beach in front of their house and many have installed sea walls to protect their homes. It also effects public beaches where there is less or no access to the water. Docks at boat launches and marinas have also become submerged. This has a negative effect on property values and tourism in the County and will be a struggle to contend with in the upcoming years.



Arenac County has three major rivers that flow through the County to Lake Huron. The Pine River, Rifle River, and Au Gres River. These rivers are beautiful natural resources home to some of the best fishing on the east side of the state. The three rivers generally run through wooded/undeveloped land until they reach Lake Huron. However, the Rifle River passes through Omer and the Au Gres River flows through the City of Au Gres. In Au Gres the riverfront is dotted with homes and businesses or other recreational uses. At the mouth of the river is a DNR boat launch. In Omer, the Rifle River flows through the City with homes and recreational businesses along the riverfront. In addition to these three rivers, there are many streams in the County and a network of County drains. In the summer months, these rivers are not just places for good fishing, they have also become popular locations for tubing, kayaking, and canoeing. There are numerous liveries located along the Rifle River that bring in thousands of people each summer weekend to enjoy the natural beauty of the river. In addition to the liveries, there are numerous campgrounds for both short and long-term visitors.

The Arenac County Drain Commission is responsible for all the County drains in the County. The Drain Commission's responsibility includes all established drains for storm water runoff, drainage and water quality according to the Michigan Drain Code, Act 40 of 1956, as amended. The Drain Commissioner is responsible for legal proceedings and hearings for open or closed channels, dams, dikes, levies, water and sewer projects, lake level control structures, pumping stations, and for the implementation of the Soil Erosion and Inland Lakes and Streams Acts. The Drain Commissioner requires that the proper size culverts are placed within the drain and that no obstructions will impede the flow of the channel. County drainage channels are an integral part of successful drainage techniques and crucial to the adequate flow of water through the County.

FLOODPLAINS

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), defines floodplain areas based on hydrological surveys, topographical surveys, soil studies, and land cover characteristics. The result of this research is a statistical model that indicates an area vulnerable to the "100-year flood" and the "500-year-flood". The 100-year-flood area is an elevation that has a 1% chance of being equaled or exceeded each year. This area has a 1% annual chance of flooding. The 100-year flood, which is the standard used by most federal and state agencies, is also used by the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) as the standard for floodplain management and determination of need for flood insurance. Structures located in the flood hazard area have a 26% chance of suffering flood damage during the term of a 30-year mortgage. This means a home in the mapped flood hazard area is five times more likely to be damaged by flood than to have a major fire.

The area that encompasses the 500-year-flood is an area with a 0.2% (or 1 in 500 chance) annual chance of flooding. The 500-year floodplain is a zone used to designate base floodplain of lesser hazards, such as areas protect by levees from the 100-year flood, or shallow flooding areas.

The flooding of land adjoining the normal course of a stream or river is a natural occurrence. Flooding events are often swift and very damaging. Floods can damage or destroy public and private property, disable utilities, make roads and bridges impassable, destroy crops and agricultural lands, cause disruption to emergency services, and result in fatalities. People may be stranded in their homes for several days without power or heat, or they may be unable to reach their homes at all.

Development around natural water courses has increased the potential for serious flooding. Rainfall that would naturally soak into the ground or take several days to reach a river or stream, now quickly runs off streets, parking lots, rooftops, and through man-made channels or pipes. Development that encroaches on the floodplain impedes the carrying capacity of the water drainage basin and exacerbates flooding. If floodplain areas are left in their natural state, damage to persons or property could be more easily avoided.





There are many benefits of protecting land in the floodplain from development. If left in a natural state the land in the floodplain can provide flood protection for other structures, it improves water quality because the water is naturally filtered, it recharges aquifers, can provide high quality recreational opportunities, and results in reduced flood insurance and disaster recovery costs. Flood prone areas are found throughout the State, as every lake, river, stream and County drain has a floodplain. Therefore, the type of development that exists within the floodplain will determine whether or not flooding will cause damage.

The floodplain in Arenac County is generally concentrated around the Lake Huron shoreline and on the land that surrounds the three rivers in the County, see Map 9. There is a larger floodplain in Au Gres Township and Standish Township due to the low-lying land along the lakeshore. There is also a large area of floodplain in Turner, Sims, and Whitney Townships.



Learning About Arenac County

Community Facilities

Every community is responsible for providing basic services to the residents such as water, wastewater, police, fire, transportation, and recreational facilities. These public facilities are the foundation of a safe and healthy home for residents and businesses alike. The location of these services, particularly the water and wastewater options, are important for growth because often new business will require these services and it will be difficult for them to locate in a place where they are not available. In the future, the permanent residents, seasonal residents, tourists and any new business will need adequate facilities for future growth and without these facilities it will be difficult for the County to attract new opportunities. In addition to public utilities, the County is responsible for providing a safe, efficient, and well maintained transportation network including rail, highways, and harbors all of which are important for new business and are important economic development considerations.

PUBLIC SERVICES

Water and Wastewater

The Cities of Au Gres and Standish have both city sewer and water systems. City water is also available to the City of Omer and the shoreline areas of Sims and Whitney Townships and a small area of Standish Township. The villages of Sterling and Twining have municipal sewage systems. The Whites Beach area in Standish Township is currently pursuing municipal water and sanitary sewer services with an agreement with the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe. Other areas within Arenac County have private water wells and septic systems. The county has no remaining permitted solid waste disposal capabilities.

Arenac County is also home to the Saginaw Midland Municipal Water Supply Corporation. This organization was created in 1946 and provides fresh water to the cities of Saginaw and Midland. The raw water is pulled from Lake Huron at Whitestone Point and pumped 65 miles south to Midland and Saginaw via transmission lines that pass through Arenac, Bay, Midland, and Saginaw Counties. There are two water intakes, one a mile offshore and a second two miles offshore, which can provide a maximum of 230 million gallons of water per day. The pumping station is located in Arenac County. This is critical infrastructure for the entire region.



Power and Communication

Consumers Energy supplies electric power to customers throughout the County and natural gas to the major population areas. Of the 6,684 occupied homes in the County in 2018, 40.2% are heated with natural gas, 5% with electricity, 32.1% with bottled, tank or LP gas, 1.5% with fuel oil or kerosene, 18.2% with wood, and the remaining 3% with other fuel types including coal, coke, and solar. Telephone service is provided by several companies including Century Telephone Midwest, Inc.. AT&T, The Pigeon Telephone Company, and Verizon. Internet is provided by AT&T Internet, Spectrum, Excede Satellite Internet, Frontier, and CenturyLink.

Police and Fire

Police protection for the entire county is provided by the Arenac County Sheriff Department in conjunction with the Saginaw Chippewa Tribal Police Department. The Sheriff Department works with smaller local police forces which serve only a few key communities in the County. The Arenac County Sheriff's Department provides services throughout the County and is also responsible for the County Jail, working with the court systems., the school resource program, a narcotics operation, and land and marine patrol with a dive team. The department operates 24 hours a day and the office is located in Standish at the County building. The County Jail is also located in Standish and has a capacity of 46 beds. In addition to the Sheriff Department, the City of Au Gres and Sims Township have their own police department which patrol their respective communities. The Saginaw Chippewa Tribal Police Department has been deputized by the Arenac County Sheriff's Department and serves both the County and the reservation. The Tribal Police Force has over 25 personnel who are responsible for dispatch, detention cells, and the court facilities.

Fire protection in Arenac County is provided by five different departments. Unlike the police, there is no overarching agency, instead each local unit is responsible for their own fire protection. Small communities

often contract with adjacent municipalities to provide services to a coalition of communities. The fire departments include Au-Gres Sims Whitney Department, Moffatt Township Volunteer Fire Department, Standish Fire Authority, Sterling Area Fire Department, Twining-Turner-Mason Department, and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources -Standish Field office. Additionally, the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe has their own fire department to sere the reservation.



TRANSPORTATION

The transportation network in Arenac County includes roads, railroads, and marinas. It is the responsibility of a community to provide a safe transportation network because this is how residents and visitors move through Arenac County. The systems should be functional, safe, and in good repair. Map 10 is a depiction of the transportation system in the County, showing roads, rail, and marinas.

Roads

Arenac County is principally accessible from the north and south by I-75, US-23, M-13, and M-65. East/West travel is limited to M-61, a section of US-23, and paved secondary roadways. I-75 traverses Arenac County from its southwest border through the northwest corner toward West Branch. There are four exits. From south to north they are the US-23 connector two miles south of Standish, M-61 two miles west of Standish, the Sterling exit, and the M-33 exit near Alger. Standish has been long known by Michigan travelers as a place to stop for food and gas on their trips to northern Michigan. Any person traveling on I-75 will pass through Arenac County and anyone traveling on US 23 will pass directly through Standish. These are key groups of people the County can capitalize on by drawing in people and becoming a destination instead of a stopover.

The Arenac County Road Commission is responsible for County Roads, while Cities and Villages are responsible for their local roads. The Road Commission is responsible for construction, maintenance, and improvements. The County Road Commission and individual Townships use road millages for funding improvements to the various local roads within their jurisdictions. According to the MDOT 2016-2020 5-Year Transportation Program, there are several projects planned for Arenac County including bridge repair and restoration and road resurfacing. Arenac County is different than many Michigan communities because it does not have the typical 1-mile square road network. The vast amounts of state land and undeveloped forest are a barrier to connectivity in the County.

Map 10 classifies the roads in Arenac County and annotates the Average Daily Traffic (ADT) Counts on each of the MDOT roads. ADT is a count used to measure the total volume of vehicle traffic on a highway or road for an average day of the year. These numbers are from MDOT. The traffic volumes of the state trunk lines range from 3,000 vehicles to 19,000 vehicles. I-75 sees the most traffic on any given day, with lower traffic counts on the other State roads in the County. However, these figures are average volumes and there are days where the traffic volume could be 20 to 40% more on various sections of roads, particularly on the weekends. These estimates can provide a preliminary indication of how well a roadway is operating.

In addition to serving the vehicle traffic in the County, the Road Commission also has the opportunity to use some of their funding to provide non-motorized transportation options along County roads. The Iron Belle Trail is planned to run through Arenac County and there are other roads in the County that represent good opportunities for trails. For example, old M-76 from Standish to the County line has a large right-of-way that may be ideal for a regional path. The County Road Commission should consult with the Planning Commission and periodically revisit the Master Plan to guide future action items or policy directions regarding any existing problem areas or future improvements.



Rail

There are two railroad lines in Arenac County both owned by Lake State Railway. The eastern line crosses the Bay county line in Standish Township and passes through Omer, Turner and Twining. Recently, the DNR secured

an easement along the railroad for the Iron Belle Trail. The trail will follow the railroad through Bay County, Standish Township, Arenac Township, and Omer where it will veer east to follow US-23 up through the northern half of the County. The second rail line also crosses the County line in Standish Township but then heads north through Standish, Sterling, and up to the northwest corner of the County. The Standish Industrial Park is located adjacent to this line and the County is working with the railroad to consider the addition of a spur to connect the industrial park.

Air

The nearest airport supporting general passenger travel is the Midland-Bay City-Saginaw (MBS) International Airport located in Tittabawasee Township (Saginaw County), approximately 40 miles southwest of Standish. MBS has an average of 56 flights per day. The airport is served by two carriers, Delta and United, with 21 aircraft based at the field -4 single engine, 6 multi-engine, 10 jet engine aircraft, and 1 helicopter.

Marinas/Water Access Sites

There are several marinas located along the Arenac County shoreline. While these are not deep water ports for shipping, there are several commercial fishing operations located in the County which take advantage of these marinas. In addition to commercial fishing, the various marinas and launches are crucial to the recreation infrastructure in the County. They provide boaters from the area and from other regions a means to visit in Arenac County via the water. They give tourists who would like to stay in the area a place



to dock, and they provide seasonal dockage for full-time or part-time residents. Three of these facilities are publicly owned access points in the County. They are the Singing Bridge Public Launch, the DNR boat launch at the mouth of the Au Gres River, and a launch in the Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area. All the access points along the shoreline provide access to the Saginaw Bay Water Trail system which stretches from Huron County to losco County and connects the Tip of the Thumb Heritage Trail to the Huron Shores Coastal Water Trail. Public Transit

Arenac County has a county-wide public transportation system, Arenac Transit. This is a dial-a-ride service out of Standish that serves the entire County. The Indian Trails and the North Star Lines have bus service from Arenac County to major population centers and to other destinations within the state and nation.

RECREATION

Arenac County contains ample natural amenities such as lakes, beaches, rivers, and woodlands. Much of the land along the shoreline is privately-owned wooded areas with numerous beaches. There are also several parks located throughout the County. A more in-depth description can be found in the County's Recreation



theater, computer lab, game room, arts and crafts rooms, toy room, open space to play, reading stations, a large gymnasium, a meeting and event room, 3 soccer fields, 2 playgrounds, basketball hoops, and a full professional kitchen. In addition to these amenities for the children, the Community Center is also available to rent for outside groups.

Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe

The Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe is an important presence in Arenac County. In recent years, the Tribe has become an essential partner for all the communities of Arenac County and their facilities are a center point of activity in the County. The Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe is primarily located in Standish Township. The majority of their facilities in Arenac County are concentrated in the southern half of the Township. In addition to these facilities, the Tribe also owns various pieces of land throughout the County. The Tribe is its own governmental unit granted the powers of self-government, the right to regulate property, the right to maintain

law and order, and the right to regulate commerce. This creates a unique environment in Arenac County, where the Tribe is responsible for all activities on their own land, and therefore, the two governments—the Tribe and Arenac County—become partners. The Tribal government does not only create the laws on the reservation, they are also the heart of the Tribal community. Members have access to senior care, education, recreation, employment, housing, a medical clinic, fitness center, youth activities, family support, and community events.

In addition to all these community focused activities, the Tribe also has a strong economic development engine. The Saganing Eagles Landing Casino and hotel are the most visible economic driver for the Tribal community in Arenac County. Additionally, the Tribe aims to expand future operations and economic development opportunities by investing in an electrical substation which would allow them to connect to the grid and purchase power as a wholesaler with the intent to sell the power and distribute it to

regional customers. In addition to this, the tribe expects to save






approximately half of their energy costs by purchasing directly from the grid. As power demand increases, the Tribe would have an opportunity to increase the size of the substation to address their development needs. One other significant opportunity the Tribe is looking into is to provide water to the region around the Reservation. The Tribe is responsible for their own water and wastewater needs, and therefore they have their own treatment facilities. The White's Beach community, located on the Lake Huron shoreline, has been drastically effected by recent rising lake levels. The community needs a more modern solution to their water and wastewater needs and as the Tribe is adjacent to the community, they are looking into expanding their water system to support the neighborhood.

The Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe is an excellent partner for the various communities in Arenac County. Each year the Tribe offers two grant cycles where any community in the County can request funding for grant projects. The funding for these grant projects comes from the 2% distribution of funds from the Casino and as of 2018, the tribe has distributed over \$200 million to local communities. This is funding that would not be available without the Casino and all the projects that have been funded because of these grant opportunities are a direct benefit from the gaming operations.

Learning About Arenac County

Existing Land Use Inventory

Existing land use in the County is a key piece of data. In many cases, the arrangement of existing land uses has set a pattern that is unlikely to change. In other areas, there may be vacant or underutilized land that can be evaluated for its development or conservation value. An existing land use analysis is designed to provide a snapshot in time of how land in the County is being used. It is useful during the development of a Master Plan because it provides a benchmark as to how land is being used. It often lets community members see patterns in growth and development.

Existing land use is determined using several techniques. In Arenac County, given the extant extent and area of the County, aerial photos and the 1992 National Land Cover Data was used. In this dataset, there are seven classifications of land use for Arenac County. Each is described in the following section. Table 23 shows the acreage and percentage of the land cover of all land uses in the County.

AGRICULTURE

Agricultural land includes land being utilized for agricultural purposes such as crop production, land lying fallow, pasture and grazing land, sod farming and orchards. It also includes farmsteads and related agricultural buildings or single-family homes. This land use makes up approximately 106,291 acres or 45.1% of the land in Arenac County. Agriculture land can be found in almost all the County aside from City and Village municipality limits, along the shoreline, and at recreation areas. Arenac County has a strong history of agriculture which is demonstrated by the Centennial Farms Program and the Historical Society of Michigan. A centennial farm is a farm that is greater than 10 acres and has remained in the same family for 100 years or more. The existence of these agricultural operations in the County highlight the importance that agriculture holds as a tradition and a way of life.

RESIDENTIAL

The residential land use category is for all types of residential uses, ranging from single-family homes to apartment complexes. In general, residential uses in Arenac County are clustered around the Cities, Villages, and shoreline. There are pockets of residential uses scattered throughout the County, especially along larger

transportation corridors. There are also single-family homes located in the vast interior agricultural land uses of Arenac County. However, those farm homes do not make up the principal land use on the farming acreage and are considered a part of the agricultural use. They are not accounted for in the existing land use chart on the previous page. Overall, residential uses make up 1,127.54 acres of land, or 0.5% of the total land use in the County.

COMMERCIAL/INDUSTRIAL/TRANSPORTATION

This land use category includes all areas used for commercial facilities, industrial facilities, and transportation. Commercial land uses include retail areas, which are most commonly found in the traditional downtown core of the Cities and Villages in Arenac County. These areas often extend past municipal boundaries along major transportation corridors. Industrial land follows a similar pattern, with the majority of the land located within the limits of a City or Village and then extending out along the corridors. Industrial land is used for processing, manufacturing, fabricating, assembling materials, or for the outside storage of equipment and materials. Finally, transportation land use means all road right of ways. Combined land use by commercial, industrial, and transportation activities totals 848.88 acres or 0.4% of the County.

FOREST

Those areas that are wooded and covered with trees are categorized as forest land. In Arenac County, the majority of the wooded land is located in the interior area of the County, especially along the Rivers. There is also some forested pockets along the shoreline of Lake Huron, and in preserved state land areas. Overall, wooded lands make up 79,186.53 acres, which is 33.6% of the total land area of the County.

GRASSLANDS

These areas are dominated by grasses and open space. They are generally used for recreation purposes like park land or can be grazing areas for animals. The majority of these areas represent parks, yards, vacant land, landscaping, or open areas. In general, the largest concentration of grasslands in Arenac County are located in Moffatt Township. There are scattered grasslands throughout the County as well. This land use makes up 495.72 acres, or 0.2% of the County.


WETLANDS

Wetlands are areas where the soil or substrate is periodically saturated with or covered with water for part of the year. Wetlands can be classified as shrub/scrub, forested and emergent. The wetlands in Arenac County are primarily located throughout all of the County, with large portions of the wetland areas located along the western border of the County and the Lake Huron shoreline. However, there are also sections of wetlands in the interior of the County and along the riverbeds. A number of the wetland areas correspond to state forest land. It is important to understand where wetlands are because they can be limiting to potential development, and may impede agricultural operations. Wetlands is the third largest land use category in Arenac County making up approximately 46,340.42 acres, or 19.7% of the land.

OPEN WATER

As mentioned throughout this document, Arenac County contains ample rivers and waterways. There is more than 50 miles of coastline along Lake Huron and more than 155 miles of riverbed. These natural features are very important to the County for drainage, environmental preservation, and recreation purposes.

Approximately, 1,131.10 acres of land in Arenac County is made up of water resources. This total accounts for approximately 0.5% of the County. Please note, this only includes the inland lakes, rivers, and streams and does not account for the shoreline.



Listening to Arenac County

BASIS FOR COMMUNITY INPUT

To be effective, a Master Plan should incorporate the input and ideas of residents. By basing the Master Plan on the goals and objectives on the opinions of the residents, land use management decisions become politically feasible and represent the intents and vision of the community. In Arenac County, citizens were given the opportunity to participate in an online community input survey. This was an online survey open to all the residents of Arenac County. A second form of input included a series of stakeholder interviews with key County leaders. Both forms of input are described below.

STAKEHOLDER INTERVIEWS

Consultants for this Master Plan update interviewed community leaders, decisionmakers, and representatives of organizations and businesses in Arenac County. The purpose of the meetings was to provide an opportunity for stakeholders to identify major issues, ideas, and concerns facing Arenac County. A total of eight in-person interviews were conducted on November 11, 2019, see Appendix A for a list of interviewee names and organizations and a full summary of their responses.

Although all residents, employees, and visitors, are "stakeholders" in the County's long-term future, these initial meetings targeted individuals representing a diversity of interests and organizations to explore a range of issues and needs. The individual/small group nature of these discussions enabled participants to be more candid and in-depth than they otherwise might be in a larger community forum. Moreover, discussions could be focused on the topics important to each individual. The stakeholder meetings are one component of the larger community visioning process, which included an online survey as previously mentioned.

ONLINE SURVEY

The online survey was made available in October and November of 2019, complete with 37 questions each of which can be seen in Appendix A of this document. There were a total of 676 responses. The intent of the survey was to establish an easy means of communication where residents and stakeholders of Arenac County could provide input about the existing community conditions and the need for future improvements. The survey was taken online at http://www.arenaccountysurvey.com/. In addition, the County sent out a press release announcing the launch of the online survey. The press release announced the web domain of the survey, as well as information about the Master Plan update process. Paper copies of the survey were also available at the County Building.

Stakeholder Summary

One the following page is a summary of six common themes from the stakeholder interview portion of the community input process.

County of Arenac Stakeholder Interview Summary Key Takeaways

This document lists six key takaways from the stakeholder interviews conduted on November 11, 2019 with County community leaders, decisionmakers, and representatives of organizations and businesses in Arenac County. The purpose of the meetings was to provide an opportunity for stakeholders to identify major issues, ideas, and concerns facing the County in preparation to update to the County of Arenac Master Plan and Parks and Recreation Plan. This is one of several community outreach activities that is being undertaken for the master planning and recreation planning process.

The County is a recreation haven for almost all adventurer types. This is the County's strongest asset and economic driver, however, more needs to be done to focus and advertise all the opportunities the County has to offer. Almost all the traffic traveling north on the east side of the State must drive through the County. In the future it will be crucial to draw in these travelers and make Arenac County a State-wide recreation destination.

There are two very distinct population groups the County, the year-round residents and the recreation focused visitors. The local municipalities have the challenge of catering to the very different needs and service expectations of these two important segments of the County population. The County and local governments need to strike a healthy balance between the groups.

The current economic development efforts in the County need to be expanded. The program needs a full-time director which will be essential to Arenac County's success.

A key focus of Recrea motorized trail devel various communities i

A key focus of Recreation development in the County in the future should focus on non-motorized trail development, connecting the County to the Iron Belle Trail and connecting the various communities in the County via non-motorized transportation routes.

Arenac County has two strong school districts that offer full-time residents the option to choose the type of program that is best for their children. The schools are a cornerstone for the local municipalities and provide a strong sense of community. The County is lacking a community college presence that would help train the local residents and keep them in the area.




Survey Summary

During the public input period, the County collected many insightful ideas and suggestions for land use, housing improvements, economic development, protection of natural features, and the overall quality of life in Arenac County. The following information is a summary of the major ideas the County received from the online survey. A complete set of survey data is included in Appendix A of this document.

Getting to know the Survey Respondents

- The online survey had a total of 676 responses. The majority of the survey respondents live in Arenac County. Overall, 540 respondents (83.6%) live in Arenac County, and 106 (16.4%) live outside the County.
- Of all the respondents who live in the County, most are property owners (88%), other relationships to the County included: renting property (5%), operating a business in the County (4%), and owning a seasonal residence in the County (2%).
- The respondents generally represent all the jurisdictions in the County. There were responses from every community aside from the Village of Turner. See Figure 5 below, to see exactly how many respondents there were from each community.
- The respondents were made up of a wide age range, with at least two responses from every age group. The age group with the largest percentage of respondents was from the 55 64 age group at 27.1%, then the remaining age groups in order of respondents are as follows: 65 74 with 22.1% of the respondents, 45 54 with 17.2% of the respondents, 35 44 with 16.9% of the respondents, 25 24 with 7.7% of the respondents, 75 84 with 5.8% of the respondents, 18 24 with 2.6% of the respondents, and under 18 and 85 and older with 0.3% of the respondents each.
- In addition to these general demographic questions, the respondents were also asked why they choose
 to live in Arenac County. There were a variety of responses, with the most common answers being
 close to family and friends, born and raised in the County, like the rural/Up North lifestyle, like the
 community, Lake Huron, and retired here. Other responses included recreational opportunities and
 affordable housing.





Summary of Key Points

Quality of Life

- Generally, respondents feel that the quality of life in Arenac County is good, but has the potential to be great.
- The County has all the pieces it needs to pull together and improve over the next 10 years, it just needs to capitalize on the opportunities.
- Three major challenges facing the County are lack of businesses and services that are essential to everyday life, the majority of the local jobs are seasonal, and crime and drug abuse.

Economy

- Economic development is crucial to Arenac County's success.
- Attracting and retaining a skilled workforce is a key issue.
- The economy is very seasonal, which is good because tourism is an economic driver for the County, but the seasonal economy does not provide jobs to support families.
- There is a split between the year-round economy for residents and the seasonal economy for seasonal residents and tourists. Both have different needs.
- Expanding and improving on the existing infrastructure will be important for success, including water, gas, and internet.

Land Use

- Future development should be focused in the existing cities and villages and at key interchanges.
- In general the county needs more commercial and retail businesses.
- Agriculture land is important to the County and should be protected from development pressures.
- There is a lack of good quality housing available for younger families. This includes homes for sale
 and rental properties. Improving the housing stock in the County and providing affordable options is
 key.
- Supporting the development of the industrial park in Standish is key.

Natural Resources

- The County is full of high-quality natural resources. These are opportunities to capitalize on in the future.
- The County is fortunate in that is has both water recreation options and wooded recreation options.
- The County has good parks that require just basic improvements to be great destinations.
- The County should support tourism and become a destination. The natural resources are the best way to achieve that goal.

QUALITY OF LIFE




Figure 6 - Components to Quality of Life

Quality of life is an important factor when anyone decides to live in or move to a region. Understanding how respondents view the quality of life in Arenac County will guide future decision making and priorities for this master plan. In the survey, respondents were asked to give their opinion on how all the quality of life factors shown in Figure 6, below, have changed over the past 5 years. Over a third of the respondents think that parks and recreation and medical services are better than they were 5 years. However, most respondents feel that these factors in the quality of life are the same as they were 5 years ago. The following categories have more than 50% of respondents say they are the same: overall quality of life, traffic, public safety/emergency services, police services, housing choices, and County services. The categories where a large percentage of respondents indicated conditions have gotten worse are road conditions/infrastructure, and business development.

Additionally, respondents were asked to list three things that would improve their quality of life. There were 310 answers to this question and the most common answers were a grocery store, improved roads, shopping/retail options, jobs, medical services, activities, and restaurants.




Figure 7 – Challenges Facing the County

When respondents were asked what they believed the main challenges facing Arenac County were today, the top three responses included unemployment, crime and drug use, and growth management. Figure 7, on the following page, shows the ranking of the other responses.

Respondents were also able to write in an answer and the most common were few high paying job options, attracting and keeping young people in the area, lack of new opportunities for development and businesses, and poverty.


In general respondents were asked to discuss any other issues they believed were important to the future of Arenac County. This question had 220 responses with a wide variety of answers. Some of the most common responses were:

- There is a need to increase the variety of shopping options in the County. Respondents do not want to see another gas station or auto parts store. They want places to buy everyday essentials like shoes, clothes, or kitchen appliances. Their opinions are evenly split on whether that be a big box store like Walmart or Meijer or local mom and pop shops.
- Respondents want an affordable grocery store that has more variety than their current option.
- They would like to see good full-time jobs to support the local community. The seasonal jobs do not provide enough income throughout the entire year to provide a living wage for residents.
- They would like there to be a general policy of reducing barriers to small business opening in the community.

Arenac County needs to be a destination. The communities should work to make this a place to stop
and one way to do that is to improve the aesthetics of the communities with seasonal decorations
downtown, new signage, and sidewalks.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Economic development will be key to future success in Arenac County, and prioritizing economic development in key areas will help the County achieve its goals. Generally, the survey respondents think all types of economic development strategies are important. The following chart shows how the survey respondents prioritize each of these economic development strategies.



In addition to the strategies above, respondents were asked if there should also be an economic development approach for attracting tourists to the area. The response to this question was favorable, 29% strongly agree with this approach, 40% agree, and only 10% disagreed. The final question pertained to how important the casino is to economic development in the County. The response on this question is more split, but respondents still agree that the casino is important for the economy of Arenac County.

AGRICULTURE

Generally, survey respondents feel that agriculture is a very important aspect of the Arenac County economy and landscape. They also think agricultural land should be preserved and protected from future development pressures. The residents indicated the top three strategies for addressing agriculture in Arenac County in the future are implementing sustainable farmable practices (chemicals, pollution, tiling, etc.), preserve and protect farmland, and build and support local or regional food economies.

COMMERCIAL AND RETAIL

Respondents would like there to be more commercial and retail services in Arenac County. Eighty-six percent of respondents would like to see more commercial options, while only three percent said they would not like more commercial options in the County. When asked where the commercial development should be located more respondents would like to see new development in existing cities and villages (81.2%) and around major transportation corridors (66.4%). Only 24.9% of the respondents would like to see development on the shoreline.

INDUSTRIAL

Respondents believe that in order to have a robust economy the County needs a diverse industrial base. Approximately 34% of the respondents strongly believe industrial jobs are key to improving the economy in Arenac County, while 49% of the respondent agree they are important. In total, 83% of respondents would support more industry in Arenac County.

HOUSING

Respondents support various types of housing options for the County. The different types are outlined in order of response as follows: single family homes in cities and villages, single family homes in rural areas or subdivisions, senior living options, multi-family housing types, and rental housing. In addition to these, short term rentals and seasonal housing were also mentioned, but at a much lower rate. Respondents generally believe that seasonal housing is a benefit to their community. The seasonal housing owners increase the tax base and support local businesses when they are in town. However, due to their seasonal nature, it is hard to rely on that income for the entire year. In the winter, jobs and the economy struggle without these residents to support them.

LAKE LEVELS

As the lake levels continue to rise, they affect all aspects of life in the County. Of all the survey respondents, 82% said their property has been impacted by the higher lake levels. Most have seen negative effects on at their homes or personal beaches. Properties along the Lake Huron shoreline, the Au Gres River, and several neighborhoods with canal systems have all been affected. Many respondents indicated they have installed sea walls to protect their homes from the water levels. Other issues include standing water, damage to roads, invasive species and an increase in mosquitoes. In addition to effecting personal properties, the rising water levels have also negatively impacted tourism activities such as access at boat launches and ramps, flooding

along the rivers in the County, and public beach access. Additionally, erosion along the coastline has become a bigger problem in recent years.

IMPROVEMENTS OVER THE NEXT 5 YEARS

The final question was open-ended and asked survey respondents what they would like to improve over the next five years. The following list is a combination of the most common responses.

- Support and encourage more business in the area, respondents would like both small businesses for shopping/retail and a large store for groceries.
- Support small business by providing incentives to new business owners.
- Capitalize on the key areas like downtowns, I-75 interchange, and prison
- Support education options like community college and trade schools to provide training for young families. Work to bring in businesses that can provide a living wage to those trained individuals.
- Expand the municipal utilities like water, sewer, and gas and also expand internet capabilities. Infrastructure is key to new growth.
- Clean up the blight.
- Work on the roads, especially the rural gravel/dirt roads. Some are impassible.

The Vision for Arenac County

OVERVIEW

This chapter is the heart of the Arenac County Master Plan and presents the goals, objectives, and action items. Goals are broad-based statements of intent and establish the direction for Arenac County. Goals could generally be thought of as the desired "ends" of successful implementation. They are derived from the existing conditions analysis, larger trends, and the input gathered via the online survey and stakeholder interviews. The plan goals express overarching aspirations that are valued and desired by the County. The plan goals, objectives and action items represent the County's intentions to support and pursue growth and development in Arenac County. The goals are presented here with brief descriptions of each. The following section presents the objectives and action items that support each goal and facilitate plan implementation.



PRESERVE THE COUNTY'S RURAL CHARACTER

Keep productive farms, beautiful natural features, and a healthy environment.



STRENGTHEN THE EXISTING CITIES AND VILLAGES

Encourage placemaking across Arenac County's town centers to ensure that they serve as quality community centers.





PROVIDE AND MAINTAIN QUALITY PUBLIC SERVICES AND INFRASTRUCTURE

Encourage and support careful coordination of local services to ensure quality and cost effectiveness.



GENERATE AND SUSTAIN ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES

Retain, attract, and grow quality employers and workforce.



PROVIDE UNIQUE CULTURAL AND RECREATIONAL RESOURCES

With over 50 miles of Lake Huron shoreline, 70 miles of rivers, and abundant forests, Arenac County will continue as a recreational and cultural destination that serves people of all generations.

GOALS, OBJECTIVES, AND ACTION ITEMS

This section introduces the objectives and action items for each of the five goals. Together, they represent the vision for Arenac County.

GOAL 1: PRESERVE THE COUNTY'S RURAL CHARACTER

Keep productive farms, beautiful natural features, and a healthy environment.

Objectives:

- 1. Support the ability of farmers to continue to actively engage in farming and sustainable agricultural practices.
- 2. Direct growth towards existing urban areas.

Action Items:

- Actively recruit agribusiness to do business in the County.
- Promote the retention, stability, conservation, and growth of Countywide agricultural activities.
- Develop a local food-promotion program.
- Assist communities throughout Arenac County in updating their zoning ordinance to allow for appropriately sized agricultural uses in non-agricultural districts.
- Encourage long-term agricultural use and preservation of prime agricultural lands.
- Promote GAAMPs generally accepted agricultural and management practices as set forth from the Michigan Right to Farm Act (PA 93 of 1981).

GOAL 2: STRENGTHEN THE EXISTING CITIES AND VILLAGES

Encourage placemaking across Arenac County's town centers to ensure that they serve as quality community centers.

Objectives:

- Make Arenac County's downtowns destinations.
- Assist cities and villages with stabilization and enhancement of existing neighborhoods in and around their town centers.



Action Items:

- Support local efforts that identify key redevelopment areas and advertise/market to desired project types.
- Support local efforts to engage various downtown enhancement groups and programs, such as Michigan Main Street Program and the Michigan Downtown Association.
- Support local efforts to develop streetscape plans and related corridor improvements efforts.
- Support local efforts to attract quality business that encourages people to spend more time in the downtown, such as sit-down restaurants and entertainment venues.
- Support the development of local wayfinding signage programs.
- Support the development of quality and affordable housing for all residents of Arenac County.
- Work with local governments to identify potential redevelopment areas for both multi- and single-family developments.
- Support land bank efforts to manage vacant, foreclosed, and blighted properties across the County.
- Address the need for housing for the County's aging population.

GOAL 3: PROVIDE AND MAINTAIN QUALITY PUBLIC SERVICES AND INFRASTRUCTURE

Encourage and support careful coordination of local services to ensure quality and cost effectiveness.

Objectives:

- 1. Maintain existing infrastructure.
- 2. Provide high quality public health and safety services.
- 3. Provide a variety of mobility options.
- Utilize the County's Hazard Mitigation Plan to protect the residents, visitors, and property within the County.



Action Items:

- Support plans to repair and replace road and non-motorized infrastructure.
- Maintain and improve current mutual aid agreements for emergency, firefighting and police services.
- Maintain a support services network to assure good quality of life for the elderly.
- Increase transit services within Arenac County to help provide better access to necessary services and employment.

- Assist with jurisdictional needs in terms of public safety.
- Support efforts to improve rail service.
- Continue the development of non-motorized paths to increase connectivity between communities in the County.
- Identify projects from the Hazard Mitigation Plan that can be initiated to mitigate damages from local hazards that negatively impact the County.
- Seek funds to complete hazard mitigation projects as identified in the plan.

GOAL 4: GENERATE AND SUSTAIN ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES

Retain, attract, and grow quality employers and workforce.

Objectives:

- 1. Build and capitalize on Arenac County's assets to attract economic activity.
- 2. Promote development and redevelopment of vacant commercial/industrial properties.
- Help residents develop the skills necessary for employment opportunities.



Action Items:

- Maintain a strong local and regional economic base and to provide jobs for residents of Arenac County.
- Support the hiring of a full-time Director of Economic Development.
- Develop agritourism and recreation tourism marketing campaigns.
- Build on existing recreational assets and improve connectivity throughout the County.
- Work with providers to expand wireless/internet services.
- Support the development of Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe enterprises.
- Target development to the Opportunity Zone (Census Tract 9705).
- Enhance the County's GIS mapping viewer with layers related to Economic Development (include Land Bank parcels, Opportunity Zone, etc.).
- Support the development of the Arenac County Agricultural & Events Center.
- Repurpose the former fairgrounds property located in Standish's industrial park.
- Dispose of non-essential County-property to catalyze new development.

- Increase efforts to work with eligible businesses to take advantage of available tax incentive/abatement programs.
- Expand existing industrial sites.
- Support the enhancement of public utilities to support future industrial growth
- Provide for adequate areas for the development of new and expanding commercial and industrial businesses, the location of which, do not hinder the overall rural character of the County.
- Assist the expansion of existing businesses and industries.
- Assist new business start-ups.
- Support redevelopment activities of former school buildings.
- Provide quality education and training to the people of Arenac County.
- Support the programs provided by the Bay-Arenac ISD.
- Support early childhood initiatives to build literacy and math skills.
- Continue and expand mentoring/leadership programs.
- Develop business and school partnerships to provide trade school experience.
- Continue to expand on vocational and co-op opportunities.
- Prepare entrepreneurs of tomorrow: Work toward developing entrepreneurial programs/classes for K-12 children such as Junior Achievement or like programs.

GOAL 5: PROVIDE UNIQUE CULTURAL AND RECREATIONAL RESOURCES

With over 50 miles of Lake Huron shoreline, 70 miles of rivers, and abundant forests, Arenac County will continue as a recreational and cultural destination that serves people of all generations.

Objectives:

- 1. Provide public access to the waterfront.
- 2. Provide a robust system of parks, trailways and other recreational opportunities.





- Provide reasonable access to parks, water, and recreational facilities and promote a variety of tourism options.
- Encourage expansion of tourism, recreational facilities, and viewsheds, as part of the county's commitment

to developing the overall economy and raising the standards for quality of life.

- Where applicable, recognize and promote natural resource conservation as a component of tourism development.
- Engage MDOT to determine feasibility of adding gateway/entryway signs near Exit 188 and near Exit 202.
- Expand recreation opportunities and facilities to meet the growing needs of County residents and the growing tourist population.
- Preserve the County's natural beauty and assets.
- Expand year-round recreation opportunities.
- Support and plan for non-motorized transportation corridors the County, including the Iron Belle Trail.

Land Use in Arenac County

Implementation of the Arenac County Master Plan requires collaboration at all levels of government. However, many of the specific land use and development decisions are made at the local level by Township, City, or Village Planning Commissions or Boards. In Arenac County, each community has their own master plan and creates their own future land use map. The map serves as a foundation for the zoning ordinance and zoning map and makes recommendations about how development should occur in each community. A future land use map does not have legal authority, like a zoning map, but it does guide decisions about zoning maps, zoning districts, and rezoning requests. Because Arenac County does not administer zoning, the County's future land use map plays a different role. It is meant to be a resource that local governments look to when creating their own future land use maps and a tool to encourage greater coordination across government boundaries. To that end, the Arenac County Master Plan takes a non-traditional approach the future land use planning and created an economic opportunities map. The economic opportunities map highlights key resources, infrastructure, land uses, and opportunity parcels that may affect the future of development and land use policy in Arenac County.

ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES

This Economic Opportunities map is a compilation of the most important resources in Arenac County and is intended as an inventory to guide local municipalities in their future planning processes. The County respects the local planning efforts that are already underway, and their specified goals and land use plans. This map reflects the general areas of potential growth in Arenac County.

Agriculture

Agriculture is an important segment of the Arenac County economy. The residents support policies that favor agricultural practices and believe preserving farmland is important for the future of Arenac County. The land that is suitable for farming, categorized as prime farmland and prime farmland, if drained, is 151,657 acres of land in Arenac County. That is approximately 64% of the entire area of the County. As over half of the

County is suitable for farming, and the survey respondents indicated that agriculture is an important way of life in Arenac County, it is a valuable resource to protect. If a soil is categorized as prime farmland that is the highest and best use of that property.

Agriculture land is often overlooked as a marginal land use, that is less important than development, but that is not always true.

Recognizing the value of this land and implementing strategies to protect it will be an important policy for the future of Arenac County. The County does not support policies that encourage development that shifts profitable agriculture land to other uses.



Recreation

The County is full of high quality recreation options, that provide residents and visitors with a full spectrum of activities in all four seasons. The County is fortunate in that it has both, a Great Lakes shoreline and vast tracks of publicly owned State Land. These two distinct environments attract different visitors depending on personal preference such as boaters or beachcombers vs hikers and hunters. Regardless of why people choose to visit northern Michigan for their recreation, it is very clear that tourism is the lifeblood of many northern Michigan economies. Arenac County is not currently one of the most popular destinations for visitors, but has all the natural resource opportunities to become one of the best destinations on the Sunrise Side of the State.

Along the Lake Huron shoreline visitors have access to clean and clear freshwater, a truly unique resource. The Great Lakes make up 5% of the freshwater in the world, and are the largest concentration of the resource in one location, aside from the glaciers. Even though Michigan has the most Great Lakes shoreline access as compared to any other State in the Country, it is still a precious resource. Arenac County is fortunate enough to have over 50 miles of Lake Huron shoreline. The Lake offers swimming and boating opportunities in the summer and also provides fishing opportunities all four seasons of the year. Arenac County is home to some of the best freshwater fishing in the State.

The Great Lakes are a true opportunity and draw for tourism in Michigan. In 2017 The Michigan Port Collaborative, conducted a study regarding the economic impacts of Michigan's ports and harbors on several local economies across the State. One of the local economies was losco County, the County just north of Arenac. According to the study, the economic impact of water-related visitors to losco County is estimated at 69.7 million dollars a year. The study found that visitors spend 5.7 million dollars in restaurants and 5.5 million dollars in lodging and vacation rentals. The economic activity supported 585 FTE (full-time equivalent) jobs and the water based activity generated roughly 4.8 million dollars in state and local taxes and 5.8 million dollars in federal taxes in Michigan. If losco County experiences this kind of economic impact on an annual basis, it is possible that Arenac County, with its similar natural resources would be able to draw a comparable economic impact as well. The County has three public access sites along the shoreline and the various local communities also have launches, beaches, and marinas. To become a waterfront destination, the County will have to market these key



properties so the people who are already driving through Arenac County realize this area could be a new destination for them to explore. Key factors in bringing in more tourists could be prioritizing more public beach access along the shoreline, and developing a transient marina for boating visitors.

Arenac County is also home to a large percentage of forested land, both public and private. This land offers tourists a different type of recreation than the Great Lakes. Here visitors can hike, backpack, off-road, camp, hunt, fish, and access the three rivers in the County. Fortunately, these opportunities are also four-season and can provide economic impacts throughout the year. The County has over 12,000 acres of State Land. Generally, this land is not managed or actively maintained. It is accessible via ORV roads. The only actively managed State Land in the County is the Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area that is managed for hunting and



waterfowl breeding. Recently there has been a surge in the popularity of kayaking, canoeing, and floating down the Rifle River. There are many liveries and campgrounds located along the River that provide visitors with watercraft to float or paddle down the river and then drop off and pick them up at designated points. The popularity of this activity is so large that it can double the County population on summer weekends.

Like water recreation, hunting, fishing and trapping also have a significant effect on the local economies of northern Michigan communities. The Michigan United Conservation Clubs recently commissioned a study to determine the economic effects of these activities. The study found that the State has 700,000 hunters and 1.1 million anglers who spend 8.9 billion and 2.3 billion dollars annually in Michigan. The study found that for every 1 million dollars spent on hunting and fishing related purchases in Michigan, 19.61 jobs are created in Michigan. Michigan is one of the top states for hunting license purchases and the northeast region of the State, which includes Arenac County, receives 451 million dollars annually due to sportsman related expenditures.

To become a hiking, camping, and sportsman destination, the County will have to advertise the opportunities available within its borders. Similar to waterfront tourism, the goal should be to become a destination and draw the travelers who are already passing through the County. The state land presents opportunities for hiking, rustic camping, and hunting. There are numerous private and two County owned campgrounds already located in the County and the popularity of the Rifle River is only increasing each year. Advertising these existing opportunities will be key for success in the future. Another avenue the County may be interested in exploring is snowmobiling. Many of the northern Michigan counties capitalize on snowmobilers in the winter, the DNR does have designated snowmobile trails located in the State Forests and National Forests that they groom, however, there are no such trails in Arenac County.

The County is also fortunate in that the Iron Belle Trail is currently planned to pass through the heart of Arenac County. The proposed route will run along the Lake State Railroad line in Standish and Arenac Townships, then head east along US-23 up to the losco County line. The Iron Belle Trail is a statewide project that is planned to run from Detroit to Ironwood in the Upper Peninsula. Trails are a boon for the local economy because they bring in trail users from other communities and the local residents often spend money while they are out walking the trail at local stores or restaurants. The visitors also bring in additional money to the region. Just to the north in losco County, the Alabaster Township Trail has been an extremely successful example of the implementation of the Iron Belle Trail through northern Michigan. Once the trail is constructed in Arenac County, it will connect to the Alabaster Township trail.

Arenac County has all the foundation it needs to become a popular destination on the Sunrise Side of Michigan. According to MDOT, there are more than 18,000 vehicles that drive through the County on I-75 on an average day and over 17,000 vehicles that pass through the County on US-23. The County is uniquely positioned in that any visitor on the east side of the state traveling north on a weekend adventure or vacation must pass through the County and if they are traveling on US-23 they must pass directly through Standish. Because of this, Standish has become a pit stop instead of a destination, but that does not need to be the case. The County has the vehicle traffic passing through it. To become a destination it must advertise all the options available for visitors in Arenac County.

Centers for Public Learning

Arenac County has several institutions that are essential education and community facilities located throughout the County. There are two school districts that operate with the County boundaries, the Au Gres Sims School District and the Standish Sterling Community Schools. A description of the school facilities and a map of the school districts can be found in the demographic section of this plan. The Au Gres Sims facilities are in the City of Au Gres and the Standish Sterling facilities are located in the Village of Sterling and Deep River Township. The old Standish Sterling Elementary School has been transformed into the Arenac Community Center. According to the Community Center website, the purpose of the Community Center is to provide a safe and nurturing atmosphere for children during the summer months and after school. The Center works with the local school districts, 4-H at Michigan State University Extension, and other local partnerships. The facility features a theater, computer lab, game room, arts and crafts rooms, toy room, open space to play, reading stations, a large gymnasium, a meeting and event room, 3 soccer fields, 2 playgrounds, basketball hoops, and a full professional kitchen. In addition to these amenities for the children, the Community Center is also available to rent for outside groups. This has really become a community foundation in Standish and is so important to the families of the community.

There are three libraries is Arenac County, the City of Omer library, the Au Gres Community Library in the City of Au Gres, and the Mary Johnston Memorial Library in Standish. All three libraries are part of the losco-Arenac District Library system. They have all forms of print, eBooks, and audiobooks. Each of these three libraries has public wi-fi access. The libraries are a community gathering space for many local groups and the three branches are open Monday through Saturday.

One final community resource is the Bay-Arenac ISD Living and Learning Center that serves Pre-Primary and High School/Young Adult students with moderate and severe disabilities. The Center's programs are intended to strengthen the educational, social, personal, and daily life skills of the students. The facility creates individual learning plans for each student and the facilities include a kitchen and laundry, computer lab, garden, and mobility training center.



Economic Development

While conducting the stakeholder interviews, the leaders of the County all emphasized the idea of working together to share resources and implement policies that are effective for their region of the County so as not to compete with each other or duplicate efforts. Thinking of the County as different regions means focusing different economic development strategies in different areas to increase their effectiveness. For example, tourism has the possibility of becoming a key factor in the Arenac County economy, so focusing strategies geared toward visitors and seasonal activities would make sense along the lakeshore and in the forested areas of the County. In comparison, the City of Standish, has a well established industrial park with the proper infrastructure to support high intensity industrial land uses which would provide steady full time employment for County residents. It makes sense to market and expand the industrial park to establish Standish as one of the main employment centers in the County. While these two approaches are very different, they are complementary, and all of the communities in Arenac County can benefit from some shared practices such as supporting small business and expanding the variety of retail and restaurants in the County.

The County has many opportunities for economic development. The following highlights some of the key features in the County:

- The Standish Industrial Park is a center of employment for the County and provides many full time jobs to County residents. Currently, the park is at capacity so the current businesses located in the park cannot expand and there are no options for new growth. The County recognized this need and has purchased a new property to move the County fairgrounds. Once the fairgrounds are relocated, there will be more opportunity for expansion. It will also open up land to a possible railroad spur from the Lake State Line through Standish.
- The Saganing Eagles Landing Casino and Hotel is another key resource for the County. There are very few casinos on the east side of the state and the Tribe recently invested millions of dollars into the hotel expansion. While the County does not receive traditional tax benefits from Tribal operations, the casino is still a key destination point for the Arenac County economy. The Casino brings in visitors and the profits from the Casino are reinvested into Arenac County via the 2% distributions program.
- The County is also home to the vacant Standish Maximum Correctional Facility. This property was a state prison that was closed in 2009 and has remained vacant. The County has no control over what happens at this site because it is owned by the State, but if the State were to ever consider selling to a private prison or reopening the facility it would be a significant opportunity for the County. Keeping communication lines with the State open is key for the future of this property.

Opportunity Zone

Opportunity Zones are a new concept recently enacted in the 2017 Tax Cuts and Jobs Act. The program is designed to spur investment in under privileged communities that have been cut off from capital and experienced a lack of business growth. The program provides three types of tax benefits for investors that relate to the treatment of capital gains. Each of the incentives are connected to the longevity of an investor's stake in



an Opportunity Fund. The program provides the most benefit to those who hold their investment for 10 years or more. The three types of benefits are:

- Temporary deferral of taxes on previously earned capital gains. Investors can place existing assets
 with accumulated capital gains into Opportunity Funds. Those existing capital gains are not taxed until
 the end of 2026 or when the asset is disposed of.
- Basis step-up of previously earned capital gains invested. For capital gains placed in Opportunity
 Funds for at least 5 years, investors' basis on the original investment increases by 10 percent. If
 invested for at least 7 years, investors' basis on the original investment increases by 15 percent.
- Permanent exclusion of taxable income on new gains. For investments held for at least 10 years, investors pay no taxes on any capital gains produced through their investment in Opportunity Funds (the investment vehicle that invests in Opportunity Zones).

Arenac County has one designated opportunity zone located in parts of Standish Township, Lincoln Township, the City of Standish, and Deep River Township. This area represents an opportunity for significant investment in the County.


Arenac County Events and Agricultural Center

The current County Fairgrounds are located adjacent to the Standish Industrial Park. Current businesses in the industrial park are looking to expand their operations, but are limited due to land availability. Therefore, the County Economic Development Corporation (EDC) is looking for a new home for the Fairgrounds. This will provide opportunity for the businesses in Standish and give the Fairgrounds a new permanent home better suited to the specific needs of the fair. The new fairgrounds will be called the Arenac County Events and Agricultural Center and the new site is 54 acres located off US-23, just south of the City of Standish. The proposed design includes an events arena with grand stands, Mid-Way Area, horse arena, animal barns for small animals, horses, cows, sheep, goats, pigs, and dogs, playground, central pavilion, parking, and a campground with over 100 spaces.

The Arenac County Events and Agricultural Center will also offer a space for various types of other events. The Sales Pavilion will offer vendors a place to sell their products at organized events, and will double as a Farmer's Market. The multi-use event center will be home to a commercial kitchen, and will be able to accommodate events up to 400 - 500 people, such as wedding receptions, bridal and baby showers, graduation and anniversary parties, and other such events. The Arenac County Events and Agricultural Center will also have the capacity to host special outdoor events such as concerts, equestrian events, and other such events.







Plan Implementation

The Arenac County Planning Commission has discussed and examined issues regarding the future of the County, in addition to receiving valuable input from County residents in the form of a public survey that was specific to this Master Plan and designed to address the range of issues and various concerns confronting the County.

As a result, the Planning Commission has compiled a complete, carefully prepared document that represents the data, efforts, and collective thoughts of Arenac County residents. This Master Plan is only the beginning of a program of action for the next 10 to 20 years. Because the future well-being of Arenac County depends upon rational, coordinated action, the County stands ready to meet with any person or group interested in the future development of the area. The County will be available to help and guide those who need advice or wish to be part of the Master Plan when acted upon.

Carrying out the Master Plan is a task which is led by County officials and the Planning Commission but is also dependent upon every responsible citizen of the County. By working together, Arenac County will continue to be a desirable, attractive, convenient, and welcoming community. The following section discusses strategies the County can implement over the next 5 years and the ways in which they can be used to ensure that the goals

of this Plan are met.

IMPLEMENTATION: COORDINATION AND ENGAGEMENT

The key to a well-planned community is the actual day-to-day use of planning documents, like this Master Plan. It is imperative that the Plan be available to County staff, elected and appointed officials, as well as business owners, developers, stakeholders from the region, and the general public.



The implementation of this Master Plan depends on its continual use by the Planning Commission and the Board of Commissioners. In its best form, implementation of this Plan will result in the achievement of the goals. Implementation is often the most difficult portion of the planning process because, while the intentions of the County, its residents, and stakeholders are clear, the legal ways and available planning tools are often not.

Regional Coordination

Development, growth, and changes in each Arenac County municipality will affect the quality of life and growth within the entire County. Community needs and resources cannot be managed effectively in silos such as a City, Village, or Township. All of the communities in the County are interrelated and effectively

addressing shared challenges requires planning that crosses local government borders and considers a larger geographic scale.

Intergovernmental cooperation is key in implementing effective strategies that advance the County. The importance of coordinated planning efforts is highlighted in the Michigan Planning Enabling Act, which created an avenue for coordination via the requirement that each unit of government who is preparing a plan to notify all neighboring or adjacent communities at the beginning of the planning process. Communities must also notify their regional planning agency, utilities, railroads, and governmental agencies within the municipality. These entities are also required to receive notice of the 63-day review period.

The Planning Enabling Act also calls for coordination by requiring any plans developed by local municipalities be reviewed by the County Planning Commission for consistency with the County Master Plan and the plans of the other communities within the County. Townships must also provide the County Planning Commission with a copy of any new zoning ordinance or zoning ordinance amendments to the County for review. In both cases, the County acts in an advisory capacity and local governments are not required to make any changes based on County comments. But the required review is an opportunity for the County Planning Commission to identify inconsistencies between the local plans and zoning ordinances. With an understanding of all the local plans and ordinances, the County is able to suggest recommendations for consistent planning and zoning across local boundaries. The County Planning Commission can take on a leadership role in coordinated planning efforts, however, the responsibility for coordinated land use regulations and policy decisions lies with the local governments.

Another coordinated planning efforts within the County is the Hazard Mitigation Plan. This is a County-wide planning effort undertaken by the Emergency Management personnel who analyze the potential for natural and man-made hazards and implement policies to reduce the impact of hazards or prepare for disasters. The County is currently in the process of updating their hazard mitigation plan.

Communication and Community Engagement

Input from the public is a critical portion of this master plan. Goals and priorities based on information identified by the public help build consensus and are easier to implement in the future. Realistic goals and policies give developers, investors, stakeholders, and decision-makers a clear vision on priorities and change in the County so they can tailor projects to meet those goals. Additionally, if the local governments know what type of projects the community will support, they can shape their programs and policies to fit those ideas.



In Michigan, local governments must provide opportunities for the public to speak on planning and zoning matters. However, effective communication extends beyond what is required by law. While it can be challenging to get meaningful public input via traditional methods like monthly meetings, there are many other alternatives a community can implement to engage with their residents. If a community takes a proactive approach to engagement that goes beyond the required public hearing requirements, they will have more

success in engaging their constituents. Other types of engagement could include focus groups, stakeholder interviews, online surveys, or social media, design charettes, or newsletters. In the route for a proactive outreach campaign, the County can be a leader by example for the local municipalities. For the update of this master plan, the County hosted an online survey which was extremely successful and had over 500 responses, they also distributed paper copies of the survey to key areas. The County used social media to advertise the survey and provide updates on the project status, and the County hosted a day of stakeholder interviews. Where local officials and community members spoke with County staff about their priorities and vision for the future of Arenac County. In the future, the local municipalities can reach out to the County for guidance on a public outreach campaign and the County could help coordinate those efforts.

Community Partnerships

Successful planning efforts must consider opportunities to engage in partnerships with other governmental and non-governmental agencies alike. While some of the goals of the master plan may be addressed through local and County policies or ordinances, many may only be accomplished through participation with non-governmental partners. Partners could include natural resources organizations, schools, non-profits, regional agencies, the Tribe, or citizen groups. By working with local organizations outreach into the community is easier, the work is more efficient, and there are more avenues for funding.

With limited resources and staffing at the County and local government levels, community partnerships will be essential in plan implementation. As the County has the most resources, they can be the authority to help assist with coordination when creating effective community partners.

Economic Development Planning

Economic development is a regional planning effort that requires a much larger scope than other traditional planning efforts. Jobs, development opportunities, and the labor market extend out past local jurisdictions. They are often considerations based on the regional capacity which is why successful economic development planning occurs at a higher level than local government. To be truly effective economic development will consider workforce training, housing, and potential properties for development across the region and coordinate those efforts between communities for effective implementation. Economic development strategies that cross local government boundaries can help communities attract new investment, support local business operations, and create a competitive economy with more business options and a larger variety of services.

Arenac County already has an economic development corporation in place which makes the County the ideal agency to continue to spearhead economic development efforts. Throughout the public outreach campaign for this Master Plan, it is clear that the community stakeholders and public members think an active and fully funded EDC will be the key to Arenac County's success in the future. The EDC can spearhead projects for industrial growth in the interior of the County, market the County as the great tourism destination it is, and also work with local utilities to upgrade the County infrastructure, especially internet access.



Identifying and Pursuing Capital Improvements

According to state law, the County can form and implement a capital improvements program (CIP). Given the reality of limited available funding at any time, and if the various County departments would collaboratively, prioritize specific projects, and create implementation schedules, the process for long-range planning would be a coordinated effort. A Capital Improvements Program which serves as a schedule for implementing public capital improvements, which acknowledges current and anticipated demands, and which recognizes present and potential financial resources available to the County, could be regularly implemented by the various departments in the County. Long-range programming of public improvements should prioritize projects on the basis of community need, be developed within the County's financial constraints, be based upon a sound financial plan, and allow for program flexibility. Per the Planning Act, the Planning Commission would be the coordinating arm working with the various agencies in this process. The Planning Commission should also continually evaluate community conditions and development factors, and continually review proposed improvements and related expenditures. With a clear understanding of the development and land use changes in the County, the Planning Commission could review projects to assure conformity with the Master Plan and make recommendations regarding prioritizing projects and methods of financing.

Grant Opportunities to Support Proposed Capital Improvements

This Master Plan can be used to identify potential funding sources to support proposed capital improvement projects, such as grant and loan programs to help fund priorities. At the Federal level, there is the Housing and Community Facilities Programs, the Public Works and Economic Development Program, Rural Business

Enterprise Grants, and the USDA Rural Development Water and Wastewater Program, to name a few. At the State level, a funding source may be the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, which offers grants from the Land and Water Conservation Fund, the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund, and the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy, (DEGLE) State Revolving Loan Fund (SRF/DWRF). Finally, the Michigan Department of Transportation also administers Federal funds appropriated under the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (Public Law 112–141, MAP-21).



Plan Updates

Master planning should be a continuous process. The objectives, policies, and recommended actions are based on the community's understanding of today's problems, technology and implementation procedures. A plan review and update procedure are necessary to address changes in community values, living patterns and perception. Therefore, the Plan will be monitored annually, updated periodically, and evaluated at a minimum of every five (5) years. The only way to make a plan truly work is to use the plan, to reference it, and to correct it or change it when it is not accurately reflecting current changes and conditions.

The stakeholders in the monitoring and update process should include the Planning Commission, County Board of Commissioners, staff, and a representative sample of interested citizens. Just as citizen involvement was an

integral part of the process that culminated the Plan, it continues to be necessary if the Plan is to remain relevant to the aspirations and needs of the community. Representatives from the schools, business and development communities, and other public agencies and groups concerned with the County should also be included in the review process.

The monitoring process, intended to be conducted annually, involves assessing factors such as socioeconomic data, development activity, changes in technology, and indicators of public opinion. An evaluation of the relevancy of the Plan in light of changing conditions is performed, and the results of the monitoring are reported in the Planning Commission's Annual Report. When the monitoring process reveals changes in the community to a degree that seriously impacts the relevance of the Plan, the Planning Commission will suggest a Plan update. The update is intended to address only those aspects of the Plan found to be outdated and no longer relevant.

Updates will be performed as needed, indicated through the monitoring process. At five-year intervals, a thorough review of the Plan will be performed to evaluate its effectiveness. The main feature of this review would be a study of all the action recommendations. Each recommendation will be examined for continuing relevance and success in implementation. The evaluation will involve two considerations. First, the effectiveness of the technique by which the recommendations were implemented will be examined. Second the action itself will be studied to determine whether the action achieved the desired objective. Those recommended actions not implemented will also be reviewed for continuing relevance and probability of implementation. This review will help the Planning Commission adjust the Plan to better achieve the goals and objectives, implement County policies, and maintain the credibility of the Plan.

Arenac County Stakeholder Interview Summary

This document summarizes the process and results of the stakeholder interviews with the Arenac County community members in preparation to update to the Arenac County Master Plan and Parks and Recreation Plan. This is one of several community outreach activities that is being undertaken for the master planning and recreation planning process.

Stakeholder Interviews

Consultants for the Master Plan update interviewed community leaders, decisionmakers, and representatives of organizations and businesses in Arenac County. The purpose of the meetings was to provide an opportunity for stakeholders to identify major issues, ideas, and concerns facing Arenac County. A total of eight in-person interviews were conducted on November 7, 2019, see the section below for a list of interviewee names and organizations.

Although all residents, employees, and visitors, are "stakeholders" in the County's long-term future, these initial meetings targeted individuals representing a diversity of interests and organizations to explore a range of issues and needs. The individual/small group nature of these discussions enabled participants to be more candid and in-depth than they otherwise might be in a larger community forum. Moreover, discussions could be focused on the topics important to each individual. The stakeholder meetings are one component of the larger community visioning process, which includes a project website and a community survey.

- Arenac County is a recreation haven for almost all adventurer types. This is the County's
 strongest asset and economic driver, however, more needs to be done to focus and
 advertise all the opportunities Arenac County has to offer. Almost all the traffic traveling
 north on the east side of the State must drive through the County. In the future it will be
 crucial to draw in these travelers and make Arenac County a State-wide recreation
 destination.
- There are two very distinct population groups the County, the year-round residents and
 the recreation focused visitors. The local municipalities have the challenge of catering to
 the very different needs and service expectations of these two important segments of the
 County population. The County and local governments need to strike a healthy balance
 between the groups.

- Arenac County has two strong school districts that offer full-time residents the option to choose the type of program that is best for their children. The schools are a cornerstone for the local municipalities and provide a strong sense of community. The County is lacking a community college presence that would help train the local residents and keep them in the area.
- The Tribe is an important entity in Arenac County and is working to expand their
 properties and the economic development opportunities available in the County. While
 the casino is generally its own entity, the 2% grants they provide to the local
 governments are very helpful and appreciated.

Ideas and Issues by Key Topics

Recreation:

A central theme in the majority of the interviews was how important recreation is to Arenac County. The main recreation the County has to offer is water-based, but there are also many other options in the large swathes of wooded land in the County. A significant recreation issue in Arenac County is the lack of public beach access, the County has 20 miles of shoreline with about 200 yards of beach. However, Arenac County does not have large sandy beaches, the coast is much more marshy, and is excellent habitat for waterfowl fishing. If Arenac County wants to be successful in the future, it needs to protect its natural resources and clean up the watersheds and the Bay.

Over the past 5 years, the County has seen a distinct change in the type of visitors to the area and a change in the type of recreation they are looking for. It used to be that 90% of the visitors to the County came for the fishing, now it seems to be a 60% fisherman and 40% family split. When families visit, there is no beach for them to access the water. Developing areas in the County where the public and visitors can access the water needs to be a priority for the near future. Amenities like a beach, splash pad, pavilion, kayak launch are going to be very important. The DNR boat launch in Au Gres is the busiest boat launch in Saginaw Bay, and there is a possible opportunity for another public beach next to the ramp. However, this is state property and the County needs to pursue this option with the DNR. Additionally, the City recently acquired a state harbor and is working to rehabilitate it for future recreation center in downtown Au Gres.

Finally, supporting trails in the County is also very important, routing the Iron Belle Trail through the County will bring a lot of people in. Supporting other local trail projects is also important such as a potential path between Standish and Sterling.

Economic Development:

There is a general feeling the Arenac County needs to expand on their current economic development efforts and really push the County as a great place to live. There are so many opportunities for potential residents, they just don't realize what the County has to offer. There should be a focus on enhancing the quality of life and attracting young people to the area. There are several examples across the Country of very rural areas that have marketed themselves to

attract young families by offering a unique lifestyle, affordable land, and a location close enough for commuting to larger cities and airports. The County has great potential for this as well. Another area of great potential is the Opportunity Zone in the south section of the County near the casino. The tribe hopes to capitalize on this opportunity and spur investment in this area. The County needs a full-time dedicated economic director, a trained workforce, and a community college system to help train individuals.

Collaboration:

There was a strong theme of collaboration between all communities and agencies throughout most of the interviews. The stakeholders view the County in sectors, in which each area has an expertise to capitalize on. For example, Au Gres should not compete with Standish for industry and employment. Standish has the area and infrastructure already in place to support these types of businesses and the other communities in the County can supplement the Standish workforce for new industry/business. Additionally, Standish has the major services for County residents like the courthouse and hospital. These are important sectors that support Arenac County and it is good they are focused together. Comparatively, Au Gres is a tourist destination. The City focuses on recreation, tourism, services, and has a housing stock that consists of larger more seasonally dependent homes. This nature of the City of Au Gres lends itself to supporting tourism and recreation industries and the City is focusing on capitalizing on those assets. The more rural areas of the County should also focus on recreation. The County has almost every natural resource available for residents and visitors to take advantage of, and the remaining Cities, Townships, and Villages should support recreation. Collaboration between the communities will lead to a successful Arenac County as a whole.

Housing:

The housing in Arenac County is very diverse and is heavily characterized by location. There are full-time resident homes located throughout the community and heavy concentrations of seasonal homes along the lakefront, rivers, and in the wooded areas of the County. Generally, the full-time residents live in and around the Cities and Villages. Standish has a housing stock characterized by smaller older homes for the full-time resident. Standish also has a very high occupancy rate, there are almost no homes available on the market. This is a challenge for Standish and the local businesses because the area is growing, but there are no homes available for new residents. The only places available for expansion in Standish are along the edge of town and around the old elementary school. Au Gres is another location with high desirability for homes, for both full-time residents and seasonal residents. Any residents looking for acreage, must go out into the rural townships away from the population centers. The County is similar to the majority of the Country in that it lacks middle housing options. There are very few opportunities for young families because they cannot afford the housing in the County. Due to the seasonal nature of the housing stock, the market is only just beginning to come back, but there has been positive signs in the recent past.

Transportation:

US 23 is a very important transportation corridor in the County, this is how most people move through the region and it doesn't serve Standish and Au Gres in the best manner. Au Gres has the widest portion of US 23 in the State. It's width is a real concern for the pedestrian scale of Au Gres. Additionally, Standish would like to work with MDOT on their upcoming US 23 project to do a complete redesign of the road and focus on sidewalks and streetscaping. The business

community would like to participate in the design process and work to develop a streetscape downtown.

The Country Road Commission is in a good place with funding, the County has a millage and most Townships also have their own millage. The Road Commission does an asset management plan every 3 – 5 years and they focus improvements to all of the roads, but mostly to the important County corridors. They would like to coordinate projects with the local communities to use resources in an efficient manner. The County focuses on Old 76, Mapleridge, and Arenac State Road. Additionally, the Road Commission is supportive of nonmotorized pathways along County roads. Most of the roads do not meet state non-motorized transportation guidelines, but the ones that do are good opportunities for pathways. In three years to Road Commission plans to rebuild Standish to Sterling on Old 76, this road has a 150' right-of-way and is a good opportunity for collaboration to build a path. Some challenges the Road Commission is currently facing are the significant increase of traffic due to the casino and ongoing issues with road ends that abut the waterfront. The Road Commission is working with the tribe on possible transportation projects in the future to better serve the traffic in the area around the casino. The County lacks strong public access to the shoreline, and one way to provide that access is leaving the vacated road rights-of-way open to public use along the shoreline. However, the Road Commission often faces issues of encroachment with property owners on either side of the right-of-way.

Marketing:

The County needs to strengthen marketing to show the rest of the State what Arenac County has to offer. The County also needs to rebrand and focus on what quality of life potential can be in the area. Arenac County is 45 minutes from the tri-cities area and close to two international airports. Anyone driving north on the east side of the State has to drive through Standish and the people who continue on 23 all drive through a beautiful section of the County. In addition to these elements the County has almost any recreation opportunity residents and visitors could want to participate in, aside from downhill skiing, and the most beautiful shoreline in the Saginaw Bay. There is no advertisement to encourage visitors or tourism. The County must capitalize on all of these elements and the people already funneling through area. Generally, they also felt the local businesses and residents could work to push good ideas and activities on the visitors. Could implement a training program and seminar that teaches locals how to become effective marketing tools for Arenac County. County undersells the opportunities available here.

Education:

There are two main school districts in the County, Standish-Sterling and Au Gres-Sims School Districts, both districts are very good and offer significantly different education opportunities for the students who are enrolled. The third district, Arenac-Eastern, in the County is currently closing and the other two districts will absorb those students. Schools are the main rallying point for the Arenac County community and through all the ups and downs of the economy schools remain a constant. It is important to the community and the districts that they work together to make education strong in Arenac County.

The Standish-Sterling District has an early education childhood development center that focuses on preschool – kindergarten. The oldest child in that building is 5 and it provides an environment that parents favor for their young children. The district also has the secondary

education center with AP classes, metal and woodshop, and can send students to the local career center where they can advance those skills and even participate in a robotics program. This district also has a strong focus on after school programs. The district busses students to the local community center after school which provides hot meals, has organized activities to get kids to learn a new skill, play a sport, and build in-person relationships with their peers. Provides a strong sense of community for the small town/rural district.

The Au-Gres-Sims district is different from Standish-Sterling in that they are a destination district. They are a public district that has a private school feel, with small classes, an enclosed campus, a focus on high-tech and global opportunities and offers students the ability to dual enroll in high school and community college. They also send students to the career center and all of the students are in one area. Due to their size, they have focused on differentiating themselves from the other districts in the region.

Tribe/Casino

The 2% grants given out by the Tribe are exceedingly appreciated by the local municipalities. All interviews who have benefited from a grant stated they were so helpful for the whole area. The Casino is a great draw for tourism in the region and really helps the City of Standish due to proximity. The Tribe hopes that the expansion of the hotel will allow a greater profit and then the tribe can give more back to the local communities in those successful grant programs.

The tribe is trying to develop jobs in Arenac County, but they have faced staffing problems. They have created full-time positions with benefits, but there are not enough people to fill those positions. They have a workforce development program for the casino. Additionally, the Tribe gives money to the schools for computers and science, in hopes that the students can more easily access opportunities and return to benefit the community as adults.

Recently the tribe installed a substation and plans to be its own utility. They will buy power directly from the grid as a market participant and use energy to drive development in the casino area.

Other Thoughts


The County is beginning to have a serious issue with flooding and the high lake levels. Sims and Whitney Townships are losing a lot of shoreline and the river is also causing a lot of flooding issues in Au Gres. There are cottages so close to the waters edge they could begin to fall in. Lakefront and riverfront protection is important.

Fairgrounds move is going to be very beneficial for the Standish community, and the existing prison is a possible asset that could really effect the Standish economy in the future, if it were to reopen.



1.Do you live in Arenac County?





3. What is your relationship to Arenac County?



4. Why do you live in Arenac County (please check all that apply)?














